City High Graduates Hear Priest in Baccalaureate

Auburn — Man's pursuit of "life, truth and love" must end in God or fail, the Rev. Alfred Horr, assistant pastor of Holy Family Church, told graduates of three city high schools at a baccalaureate exercises here on Sunday afternoon.

Father Horr, who delivered the baccalaureate address, spoke in the Emerson Auditorium of East High School to members of the graduation classes of East, West and Central High Schools.

Every heart, mind and soul, Father Horr said, desires the same three things — life, truth and love.

The first deep-seated yearning in the human heart is the yearning for life. Of all our treasures, it is that which we surrender last and with greatest reluctance.

The second most fundamental craving is the desire for truth, he stated. "We are incurably bent on knowing and discovering the truth of things."

Thirdly, man has the desire to love and to be loved. From the very first day in the Garden of Eden, even to the end of time, man has thirsted and will thirst for love.

Warning that life, truth and love can not be found fully in this world, Father Horr asked, "Where then shall we find the source of these realities? We must go beyond the boundaries of this world, out to Some One who is Pure Life, Pure Truth and Pure Love — that Being is God!"

Counseling the graduates not to make "the terrible mistake" of measuring success in terms of worldly reputation or wealth, Father Horr explained: "The answer to the question of destiny is that I have been made to know, love and serve God for all eternity. Each soul that is sent into this world from the throne of God comes to this course over a brief span of years, is destined to reappear once again before Him who sent it on its way freighted with virtues and laden with the precious cargo of merit to be acquired from his good deeds done for God, to receive the crown God made for him the day of his birth. That alone constitutes success. That is our sole purpose in life, and, yes, that alone first the kingdom of God and his justice and all these other things will be added unto you."

2,472 Diplomas Awarded By Diocesan Schools

Parochial schools of the Rochester diocese presented diplomas to 2,472 graduates at exercises held last week, according to the announcement of the Rev. Dr. Charles J. Mahoney, diocesan superintendent of schools.

At least 90 per cent of these graduates received the Preliminary Certificate of the New York State Board of Regents, Dr. Mahoney stated.

Among the 79 parochial schools of the diocese, St. Ambrose in Rochester took first place this year with 28 graduates. Two other Rochester parishes, St. Monica's with 23 and Blessed Sacrament with 21 were second and third in the number of pupils graduated.

Reports from the 11 Catholic high schools of the diocese revealed the total number of graduates for this year to be 477.
