The Bishop was assisted by the Rev. Dr. John E. Maney and the Rev. Joseph Lynch. The Novices were completing their six years of novitiate training.

Parents of the Novices and newly professed were congratulated by Bishop Kearney on the honor bestowed upon their homes.

Addressed by Bishop Kearney, he said:

"We who dedicate our lives to the service of Jesus Christ are deeply conscious of the fact that He has not only conferred great honor on us but great responsibility," the Bishop said.

"You will have a certain number of souls; the shedding of Christ's Blood for their salvation will be part of this 'problem' of your lives to this extent—that every thought, word and action that brings them any closer to Jesus Christ is proof that you are faithful to your responsibility of applying to their souls the merits of the shedding of the Precious Blood of Jesus Christ upon the cross."

"Therefore, every recurring July should be deeply significant to you, not simply because it recalls the anniversary of your reception and profession, but especially because it will recall for you the part that you play day by day in the application to the souls of little children or of grown women, of the merits of the shedding of Christ's Precious Blood on Calvary."

Notification of the recognition of service well-performed came from Ward H. Harris, Brigadier General, U.S. Army commanding the 1st Cavalry Division Artillery.

The general's commendation stated:

"During this period your work has been of the highest order. Despite the wide separation of units of the artillery you made it a point to see that all men had religious services regularly. Your counsel to the men has developed a high moral standard throughout the command."

"The chapels constructed from your plan and under your supervision both at Camp Drake and later at the Ota-Kodomo Camp are a monument to your ingenuity. Your attention to duty, personality, and high interest in your work has been an inspiration to all ranks. Your assistance to the Division Artillery Commander in both religious and moral matters has been of untold benefit to the command."

Authorization to wear the Army Commendation Ribbon is by direction of the Secretary of War.

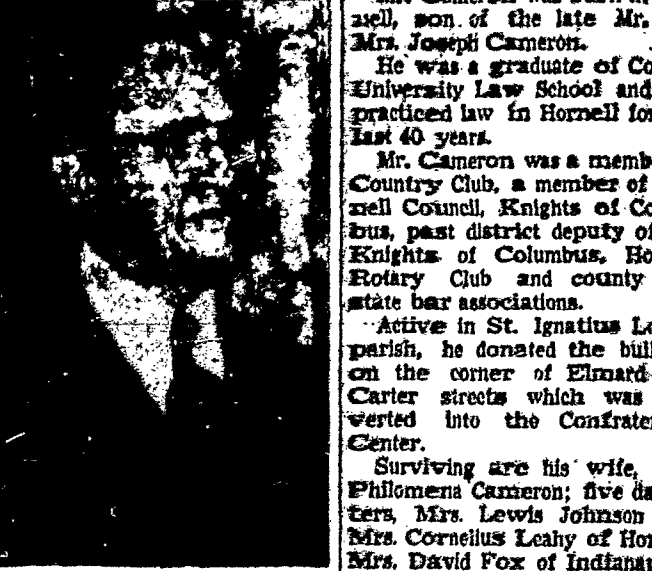
F. M. Cameron Rites Conducted in Hornell
