FATHER WHALEN RETURNS FROM MARINE SERVICE

Auburn—Leslie Whalen, former assistant at St. Mary's in Auburn has returned home after nearly three years spent with the Marines.

He entered the Chaplain Corps of the Navy in September 1943 and attended the Chaplains School at Williamsburg, Va. He then served as chaplain at Camp Elliott, California. From there he was assigned to the Pacific area on transport duty and after a time was returned to Camp Pendleton, California as assistant to Chaplain William Maguire of Pearl Harbor base.

Next assignment was to the Pacific area to serve with the 4th Division of the 25th Marines. While with the 4th Division he supervised the building of a chapel for his outfit and saw that it was completely equipped. Previous to this time Mass was said out of doors. After the 4th division returned to the states, Father Whalen served as chaplain at the supply depot at Maul. He remained there, although eligible for discharge, until the Missionary Orders on Maul were able to take care of all remaining servicemen.

Father Whalen was appointed to St. Mary's in Auburn shortly after his ordination in 1938 and in 1941 was assigned to St. Peter and Paul in Elmira. He remained in Elmira until entering the service in 1943. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. George Whalen of Rochester. He will be on terminal leave until August 1.

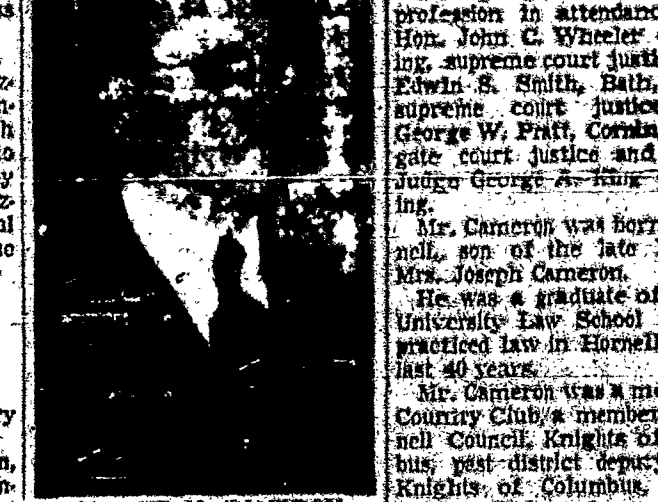

F. M. Cameron Rites Conducted in Hornell

Hornell—Solemn funeral services for Francis M. Cameron, attorney and prominent Catholic layman, were held Monday, July 1 in St. Ignace Loyola Church. Mr. Cameron was a brother of the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Joseph S. Cameron, pastor of Immaculate Conception Church of Rochester and the Rev. Ignatius M. Cameron, pastor of St. Ignace Loyola Church here.

Mr. Cameron died June 27, 1946 at the age of 57 in Lourdes Hospital, Birmingham. He was in Birmingham on business and was taken ill on the previous Sunday. (Editorial on Page 4).

Y. He was also son of the late Robert Cameron, Hornell, the brothers, Msgr. Joseph S. Cameron, the Rev. Ignatius M. Cameron, pastor of St. Ignace Loyola Church; Charles and William Cameron, Rochester; and John Cameron of Los Angeles; two sisters, Mrs. John Robinson and Mrs. Mae Lally of Canastota.
