

### Catholic Activities Increase in Germany

ROCHESTER, (NC) — Catholic activities throughout Germany are showing momentary respite, in spite of extraordinary disturbed communications and disrupted transportation. In the Westphalia, are being restored by men and women who put in several hours per week of manual labor to clear the debris and carry building material.

In Munich, it is hoped that the famous Frauenkirche, Cardinal Faulhaber's cathedral church, can be rebuilt within a decade with the help of volunteers. In clearing up debris valuable art work is often found that had been given up as lost.

The most pressing task facing German Catholics remains the relief required by the thousands of refugees pouring in from the Eastern provinces. Over one million of them have arrived in Bavaria so far, and almost twice as many are expected before the end of this year.

In the field of youth activities the outlook is also encouraging. Bishop Albert Stohr of Mainz, who is in charge of this field of Catholic activity, has presided over a gathering of diocesan youth leaders who agreed on youth policies. Imparting these policies, Ludwig Wolf, a youth leader at numerous meetings in various parts of Germany, said Bishop Franz J. Schuler, bishop of Mainz, is reported to be holding 1,000 youth leaders at Mainz, Aachenberg, the diocesan youth center of Cologne. In Mainz a Catholic youth center is being planned by youth men and women.

**Reich Prisoners Get Prayerbooks**

New York — (NC) — Thousands of copies of the New Testament and prayer books in the German language are being printed by War Relief Services-National Catholic Welfare Conference for distribution to German prisoners of war still held in Europe.

This activity is part of the extensive religious program inaugurated during the war for prisoners in this country. With the return of most of the prisoners to Europe, it will be necessary to issue them in France alone there are more than a million prisoners.

**Reich Prisoners Get Prayerbooks**

Besides such religious articles as hymn books, medals and rosaries, War Relief Services-N. C. W. C. has supplied German prisoners of war camps in the United States with items such as tobacco, games and books.

The results of this project are shown in a letter received from the editor of a large prisoner of war magazine who says that "by means of War Relief Services-N. C. W. C. has immeasurably helped the moral and spiritual reconstruction of the prisoners. The most are going home closer to God than when they arrived, thanks to all who helped."

**Lurid Magazines Seen Cause of Delinquency**

Washington — (NC) — Lurid magazines, ranging from the dime "pulp" to the more costly "slick," contribute heavily to the ways of juvenile delinquency throughout the nation, Representative J. M. Coombs of Texas asserted in advocating here a campaign to clean the "filth" from the nation's magazines.

"Juvenile delinquency" said the Congressman, a former juvenile court judge, "is fostered principally by unwholesome moral development. Many a youth has become a delinquent because he had no moral tendencies of either good or bad — to begin with. These come influence perhaps lurid magazine literature, perhaps a bad association, has tipped the scales against him."

### TRINIDAD BIRTH CONTROL SCORED

London — (NC) — Archbishop of the Port of Spain, Trinidad, visiting London to discuss educational problems in the British West Indies with the British Colonial Office, condemned current British government recommendations that birth control be taught to colonial peoples.

Speaking to reporters, the Archbishop said that the teaching of children in regard to birth control is a matter of grave concern to his people. He stated that a girl in Trinidad does not regard herself as a complete person until she becomes a mother. Archbishop Healy also expressed disapproval of British proposals for a national birth control program. He suggested that the Catholic Church should help to spread birth control propaganda as "outlets."

The Archbishop further told his interviewers that his See in the island of Trinidad, Guyana, St. Vincent and St. Lucia, a mixed community of 70,000 whites, Negroes, East Indians, Syrians and even Chinese, has a standard of education, founded on Church establishments, which is said to be higher than that of Britain or Ireland. American lawyers visiting his territory had told him, he said, that the standard among lawyers here is as high as anywhere in the world.

### Rabbi Asks Russia Ease Religious Laws

Chicago — (RNS) — A request that the Soviet Union give Jews and other religious groups in Russia greater freedom of religious instruction was embodied in a series of resolutions on international social and economic problems adopted by the Central Conference of American Rabbis at its 57th annual convention here. The conference was presided over by Dr. Abba Hillel Silver, president of the organization, and was attended by some 400 Reform rabbis.

Addressed to the Soviet Ambassador in Washington, the conventional request called for "larger opportunities to secure religious instruction and to develop religious institutions" in Russia and urged the Soviet government to revoke laws prohibiting religious instruction to people under 18 years of age, and to permit the opening of religious seminaries for the training of rabbis and religious leaders.

### Sociality Schedules Social Institutes

Montreal, Que. — (NC) — Three-day institutes on social problems will be held at 50 sites in the United States and Canada during the coming year under the auspices of the Sociality of Our Lady and its Institute of Social Order.

This year's institutes will be held at the Summer School of Catholic Action here by the Rev. Daniel A. Lord, S.J., national promoter of the Sociality and national executive director of the Institute of Social Order. A staff of 15 priests will conduct the institutes, which are to begin next October.

### Missionary Dies on Vacation

Levellon, Me. — (NC) — The Rev. Albert Arthur Clouder, Maryland missionary, who spent all his life in the field, died here on vacation. He was 74 years old.

### Boy's Town, N.Y. Will Be Excavated

Buffalo, N.Y. — Three centuries of life and action will be scraped away by archaeologists this August when excavations begin at the old Huron village of St. Ignace. It is here where the Jesuit missionaries, St. John de Brebeuf and St. Gabriel Lalumiere, were martyred by the Indians.

The announcement was made by Clarence Fox, president of the Huron Society of Western Ontario, which will conduct the excavations. The site of the village was found in 1838 as a result of research sponsored by the university. The Jesuit Fathers had been searching for the site for the past hundred years.

### Catholics Back Schools Against Hungary Law

Budapest — (NC) — The Hungarian Minister of Public Education has announced here that Catholic schools will be supervised by committees appointed by the government, thus ending the autonomy of teaching and administration which Catholic schools were granted by Hungarian law in 1934.

This latest maneuver in the struggle over the continuation of Catholic education in this country comes at a time when responsible Church education officials, seeking to correct erroneous impressions that have characterized most of the public discussions on the subject, have prepared a statement on the nature and extent of Catholic schools in Hungary.

They describe as one example of methods of attacking Church schools the wide-spread publication in the leftist press of insinuations of "conspiracies" in these institutions. Upon legal investigation every one of these accusations has so far been found to be without basis in fact, they point out.

Schools listed

Leading with the comment that "the number of schools of Catholic character in Hungary is extraordinarily large," the statement of the school authorities lists Catholic schools within the pre-war boundaries of the nation as follows:

"Gymnasiums for boys and girls students, 51; commercial middle schools, 17; lycées and teacher training schools, 33; middle schools, 53; technical schools, 15; elementary schools, 2,534 (as of 1933)."

These schools, it is stated, are supported partly by the Church and partly by the State. All of them, up to 1934, were under

of his educational background should know better and since they are a religious institution of the leaders of three great religious bodies, prompt and clear action should be taken to prevent them from being interpreted as acquiescence, to brand them for what they are, absurd and utterly false, and for the following reasons:

It was the opposition that sent so many of them to the concentration camps. Furthermore, it was precisely because so many Germans failed to heed the warnings of their religious leaders that Nazism flourished.

expense of the taxpayer. Those facts have now been ascertained upon the whole world."

After this crudely erroneous explanation of the rise of Nazism, Clark concludes with another theory equally as crude and erroneous. He writes:

"When I was a lad many of my friends and schoolmates were Catholics. We attended our separate churches on Sunday and played together on week days forming friendships that have lasted a lifetime. Then came the movement for parochial schools with the natural and inevitable result. After one got it became necessary for the authorities to forbid the arranging of athletic games between public and parochial schools. Are we treading in the footsteps of Germany?"

Clark's bigoted attempt to calumniate religious schools, particularly Catholic schools, was refuted conclusively in last week's issue of The Star (July 4th) by Father Magee.

The editor of The Star presents to Father Magee's article a rebuttal of Clark's allegations against Catholic schools in the same front page column in which Clark's letter had appeared previously.

Expressing surprise that anyone with Mr. Clark's educational background would indulge in intolerance, Father Magee states that his letter is prompted "just alike be interpreted as acquiescence" in Clark's serious indictment of Catholic, Protestant and Jewish leaders.
