

Christ's Enthronement Will Preserve Home, Clergy Congress Told

Milwaukee—Society's preservation lies in the enthronement of Christ in the home, the Rev. George W. Eckl, pastor of St. Andrew's Church told delegates to a National Congress here for priests actively engaged in the work of the Enthronement and Night Adoration of the Sacred Heart in the home.

The Congress, first of its kind, was held with the permission of His Excellency, the Most Rev. Moses E. Riley, Archbishop of Milwaukee on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, this week.

Father Eckl, only delegate from the Rochester diocese, spoke on "The Importance of Religious Home Life as the Foundation of the Social Reign of the Sacred Heart."
