## Germany Sent 2,740,747 Pounds of Relief Goods

New York — (RNS) — Relief goods sent to Germany by War Relief Services-National Catholic Welfare Conference now total 2,740,747 pounds following the seventh shipment of supplies for that country. It was announced here. The latest shipment included 503,348 pounds of flour and 50,277 pounds of clothing, blankets, and shoes.

Also included in the shipment were recreational and occupational materials for use in UNRRA displacement persons' camps in Germany. They included 83,550 pounds of such items as books and other educational supplies, carpentry and leather kits, and woodworking and carving sets.

## Christ's Enthronement Will Preserve Home, Clergy Congress Told

Milwaukee — Society's preservation lies in the enthronement of Christ in the home, the Rev. George W. Eckel, pastor of St. Andrew's Church told delegates to a National Congress here for priests actively engaged in the work of the Enthronement and Night Adoration of the Sacred Heart in the home.

The Congress, first of its kind, was held with the permission of His Excellency, the Most Rev. Moses E. Kelly, Archbishop of Milwaukee on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, this week.

Father Eckel, only delegate from the Rochester diocese, spoke on "The Importance of Religious Home Life as the Foundation of the Social Reign of the Sacred Heart."

"A Christian Home," Father Eckel told the delegates, "is one in which the spirit of religion permeates the atmosphere of the home — the pictures on the wall and the crucifix; the books on the shelves and the magazine on the library table; the holy water font at the bed-room door; the little altar or the shrine with a statue and votive light burning — all these present an atmosphere permeated with faith and prayer."
