## Cathedral To Rise In Australian Bush

New Nordic, Western Australia—(NC)—The foundation stone of a new Cathedral of the Holy Trinity, designed by Father Urban, O.S.B., after the Basilica of St. Peter in Rome, was blessed here by His Eminence, Norman Cardinal Gilroy, Archbishop of Sydney, as one of the features of centennial celebrations of the founding of the Benedictine mission here.

## St. Bernard's Alumni Jubilee Reunion Set

### Ex-Army Chaplain Heads For Africa as Missionary

Home only a few months from Europe and Alaska where he served as an American Army chaplain, the Rev. Charles Erb, S.V.D., will soon be heading overseas again, this time to do missionary work on the African Gold Coast.

A former Rochesterian and a graduate of Holy Family School, Father Erb expects to depart for his new assignment early next month. He is now visiting at the home of his brother Herbert Erb of 138 Child Street in Rochester.

The former Army chaplain, a priest of the missionary Society of the Divine Word, will go to Accra, capital city of the Gold Coast, West Africa, which is a British Crown Colony.

The Africa Mission, established ten years ago by the Fathers of the Divine Word, has 15,000 Catholics and 700,000 more natives who are potential converts. Father Erb plans to make a moving picture of the Africa Mission in order to give Americans a better knowledge of Catholic mission life on the Dark Continent.

In going to Africa as a missionary, Father Erb is fulfilling plans which the outbreak of war forced him to postpone until now. As an army chaplain he served with the "Alamo" Forces in Alaska and Germany.

### Clergy to Meet In Rochester October 22-24

Golden Jubilee Reunion of the St. Bernard's Seminary Alumni Association is scheduled in Rochester Oct. 22, 23 and 24. The new seminary Alumni Bulletin announces in its first issue this week. His Excellency, Bishop Kearney, will act as host.

Postponed since the actual 50th anniversary date of St. Bernard's in 1943, the alumni celebration will honor particularly the more than 60 returned alumni chaplains of the association.

Figures, as yet incomplete, compiled by the Bulletin, show that of the more than 125 former St. Bernard's students who entered service, 52 have already been discharged, 15 to resume pre-war duties in the Rochester Diocese.

Under the leadership of Bishop William R. Arnold, rector of the St. Bernard's Seminary, the alumni of St. Bernard's, alumni of the Rochester seminary served in every major engagement in World War II, the publication reveals.

Only one fatality was suffered. The Rev. Neil Doyle from the Diocese of Hartford, Conn., gave his life in New Guinea.

The two-fold purpose of the alumni reunion was voted upon at a meeting in Rochester of the Executive Committee of the association.

The tentative program worked out by the committee includes a Solemn Pontifical Requiem Mass for deceased alumni on Oct. 23 and the Pontifical Jubilee Mass on Oct. 24.

The Alumni Banquet is tentatively scheduled for the 25th at Hotel Seneca.

Present at this week's meeting to explain the aims and purposes of the Catholic War Veterans were National Organizer William Cummings of Buffalo; and Jake Grotz, Commander of Erie County C.W.V.

Father Whalen explained that membership in the newly formed post is not confined to members of Holy Rosary Parish but is open to all Catholic veterans of the city who wish to join.

Candidates for membership in the Catholic War Veterans, Father Whalen said, must be Catholics and veterans of service in the armed forces of the United States with records of honorable discharge.

### 986 Veterans Seek 152 Apartments

The three weeks application period for the Rochester Civic Rental Project at Fenwood Park ended today. A total of 1641 rental application forms have been given out by the eight local commercial and savings banks and, according to Mr. Elmer B. Millman, yesterday's returns totaled 986.

Although many Veterans sent in applications just in time to make the deadline of August 15, even the last-minute applicants will have the same chance as the first, said Mr. Millman. The anonymous rental committee, consisting entirely of non-veterans, will start work immediately to determine which of the 986 applicants the 152 apartments will go to.

Selection is being determined entirely on merit and urgency of the veteran, and the date of the application will not be given no consideration whatsoever. The veterans who do not meet the urgency requirements will be notified within a week so that the Rochester Plan will not interfere with whatever other housing plans they may have.

### NCWCAide Goes To UNRRA Meet

Austin, Tex.—(NC)—Msgr. Frederick O. Beck, Texas chaplain of the Catholic Daughters of America, said that "with its modern equipment of movies, record playing devices and loud speaking system, it is the 1946 method of fulfilling the Divine Command, 'Go, teach all nations whatsoever I have commanded you.'" The Rev. A. J. Burggraf, C.S.P., national moderator of the Convert League, called it a fitting memorial to the late Father Francis Lyons, league founder.

The two priests were speaking of the "Queen of Peace" motor chapel trailer, donated by the Catholic Daughters of America at their recent convention in St. Louis and presented to Father Burggraf at St. Austin's Chapel here.

The presentation was made by Mrs. A. J. Le Blanc, CDA State Regent for Texas, who said that while the trailer chapel was the gift of the CDA, the altar, vestments and sacred vessels were donated by the Junior Catholic Daughters.

The trailer chapel is equipped to house comfortably two priests while in the mission fields and, besides sleeping quarters, has a compact galley, food storage space and small electric refrigerator. It will be used by the Paulist Fathers for mission work in rural sections of Texas.
