Official words of commendation and appreciation for St. Bonaventure College's contribution to the war effort have been received from Army Service Forces Headquarters, Washington, D. C. It was announced by the Very Rev. Thomas Flanagan, O.F.M., president.

In one of the first communications received by Father Thomas after his return from a three-month tour of Europe, the exceptional work done by the college during the war was held up for praise by Lieutenant General Leroy Lutes, Commanding Officer of the ASF.

McCarthy, recently released from the armed forces, served overseas about three years with the Quartermaster Corps of the 11th Airborne Division.

Prior to his military service he was employed by The International Harvester Company in Elmira.

He is married to the former Alice Clark and is a native of Elmira. He was educated in St. Patrick's Parochial School and the Elmira Free Academy. He resides at 751 East Market Street.

St. Peter and Paul's Cemetery has been established for 100 years. According to available estimates 40,000 people are buried in this historic Elmira cemetery.

Clergy to Meet In Rochester October 22-24

Golden Jubilee Reunion of the St. Bernard's Seminary Alumni Association is scheduled in Rochester Oct. 22, 23 and 24, the new seminary Alumni Bulletin announces in its first issue this week. His Excellency, Bishop Kearney, will act as host.

Postponed since the actual 50th anniversary date of St. Bernard's in 1943, the annual celebration will honor particularly the more than 50 returned alumni chaplains of the association.

Figures as yet incomplete, compiled by the Bulletin, show that of the more than 125 former St. Bernard's students who entered service, 42 have already been discharged, 18 to return to their duties in the Rochester Diocese.

11 Missioner-Nuns Hailed on Departure

Boston—(NC)—Characterized by Archbishop Richard J. Cushing of Boston as "missionaries of God and man, holding fast to God with one hand and grasping for souls with the other," eleven nuns of the Franciscan Missionaries of Mary, bound for assignments at distant posts, were honored at a departure ceremony which drew 3,000 persons to the Cathedral of the Holy Cross here.

Four of the nuns, Mothers Mary Immaculate, Mary Immaculate, Mary Immaculate and Sister Mary Loretta, are bound for China. Two, Mothers Mary Adolph and Mary of St. Helier, are going to Japan. Two others, Mothers Mary of St. Matthew and Mary Emzella, are enroute to Africa. Mothers Mary Jeanne Pierre and Mary Divine Amor are going to the Philippines and Mother Mary Elmira will work in the Far East.

Archbishop Cushing emphasized that philanthropic societies may enable the missionaries to equip their institutions with necessary equipment by wisely investing their funds.

"The self-sacrificing devotedness of Catholic Sisters cannot be bought by gold."

"Even the untutored pagan in his pain-stricken poverty feels that it is not of this world," he said.

He recalled that the Franciscan Missionaries of Mary was founded less than 70 years ago, but today numbers 8,000 members, with 300 houses in every continent of the world. He reminded that seven martyrs of the community, killed during the Boxer Rebellion in China in July 1900 will be beatified on November 24.
