

Bishop Officiates at Mass For Joseph A. Hart

Placental Equilibrium
 Mass for Joseph A. Hart, 51, well-known Rochester Post Office employee and brother of the Rt. Rev. Bishop, William M. Hart, V. O., was celebrated Saturday, Aug. 21, 1946, by His Excellency, Bishop Kearney in the cathedral, Conception Church.

Funeral services were held from 10 to 11:30 a. m. and from the church at St. Basil was in Holy Sepulchre Cemetery.

Mr. Hart, who was superintendent of the Dewey Avenue branch of the Post Office, died at St. Mary's Hospital Tuesday, Aug. 13, 1946, two weeks after suffering a heart attack. Monsignor Hart was at the bedside when he died.

"If the love of God were predominant, we would have none of the above, there would be a greater and more sanctified home life, resulting in better individuals, thus upward through the nations creating better nations, better relations among the nations and we would not have to worry about peace for 20 years."
