Aquinas to Open with 1600 Boys; Fr. Sheehy Named to Head Annex

New principal of "Aquinas Annex," the freshmen school of Aquinas Institute, to be opened on LaGrange Ave., off Ridgeway Ave., on Wednesday, Sept. 4, will be the Rev. Vergus J. Sheehy, C.S.B. It is announced today by the Rev. William J. Duggan, C.S.B., Aquinas Institute principal.

Father Sheehy has been a member of the Aquinas faculty since 1937.

With 1600 boys enrolled at Aquinas Institute for the fall term, 480 of those, members of the freshmen class will be instructed in the reconverted public school building on LaGrange Ave. The freshmen increase is 23 over last year, Father Duggan states.

Total increase in enrollment in the entire school is 250 with some returning servicemen enrolled in classes. Five extra teachers will be added to the faculty among whom will be the Rev. Albert J. Shamon of St. Mary's Church, Rochester.

Home from active duty as a chaplain in the U. S. Navy, the Rev. John Omorato, C.S.B., a former member of the faculty will resume his duties at the Dowe Ave. School, in September.

Robert H. Guenther, alumnus of Aquinas Institute and a returned war veteran will be added to the faculty as assistant to Raymond J. Hasenauer, music director. Guenther studied at the Eastman School of Music and will instruct in music at Aquinas Annex. He was graduated from the Catholic boys' high school in 1940.

Renovation of the former public school building has been underway during the summer. The Basilian Fathers in charge will have the structure in readiness for the grammar school graduates when they report on Sept. 4.

Nuns in Greece Aided In Orphan Care by Jewish Refugee Here

Generosity of a Jewish refugee here in Rochester is helping ease the hardships of a group of nuns who have been caring for Jewish children orphaned by the Nazis in Greece.

Dr. Eva Lichtenfeld, D.D.S., of Rochester hasn't forgotten the courage and kindness of the Sisters of Charity of St. Vincent de Paul at the Franco-Greek School in Salonika, Greece, who took in the little Jewish orphans even at the risk of retaliation from the Nazis.

Through a Greek refugee who worked with her as a dentist in the clinic at the Radogee Shelter in Oswego, she learned of the Franco-Greek School.

It was he who had taken the children to the Sisters when it seemed only they could save the little ones from starvation and the Nazi terror. For the parents, who then numbered about 40, were left on the convent porch during the night. Before he escaped to this country, he left what little money he had with the Sisters.

Dr. Lichtenfeld started sending packages and wrote to the Sisters in an effort to ease their burden of care.

Recently she received a letter from the Superior, Sister Rochelle, who welcomed the gratified surprise at the unlooked and unexpected helping hand from America.

"We are happy that Good Providence has inspired you to help us," Sister Rochelle wrote. "We have suffered so much during the war and the aftermath."

She requested trousers for the boys and shoes in large sizes for the children have big feet, if you please." Her said there were now 110 orphans, 64 girls and 46 boys.

The Sister told how they had all longed for an aunt or uncle in America who would send packages, as they did to the people of Salonika. "In you," she pointed out, "the Good God has given us a godmother, God bless you!"

Dr. Lichtenfeld has already as-

signed 30 pairs of new shoes and is preparing to ship them to Salonika.

Her work in behalf of the Jewish and Greek orphans is only one of many such activities. Dr. Lichtenfeld regularly sends packages to her excited people and others in China, Belgium, Hungary, France, Greece and Italy.

Born in Gotzaway, she left her native land more than 20 years ago and went to Italy where she worked until she could pay her passage to this country.

Several of her family and close friends who did not get out of Germany in time were deported to other countries and subsequently died or were killed. Others just disappeared and were never heard of again.

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
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
