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Bishop Scores Polish Pogrom

New York — (INC) — Denunciation of the instigators of, and participants in, the Kleist massacre of Jews has been delivered by Bishop Theodor Kubina of Czestochowa in a proclamation carried over Radio Warsaw. The Inter-Catholic Press Agency has reports adding that despite the general proclamation certain elements in the Warsaw regime have attacked the prelate by name as one who did not take a positive stand on the Kleist massacre.

The prelates of this crime which merits the wrath of God and man," the Bishop is quoted as saying, "trampled upon the dignity of man and committed a terrible violation of the Christian commandment: 'Love thy neighbor' and of the general commandment: 'Thou shall not kill.'

Investigating the motives of the criminals as "then to the beliefs of the Christian community," Bishop Kubina declared that those guilty had been condemned without reserve by all who possessed a heart throbbing with love of the neighbor and attachment to the teachings of our fathers and fathers' fathers.

As a representative of the Christian community, believing steadfastly in the Christian faith and moral principles, the Bishop appealed to all citizens of Poland to give no heed to criminal stories and rumors about Jews.
