Archbishop Byrne spoke at the close of a colorful candlelight procession from the Cathedral of St. Francis to the northern gateway of the city, where he lighted the Cross of the 24th year, a memorial to the mission, the cross was lit by the Rev. Body of St. Dominic Put in Original Tomb

Vascona City — (Radio NC) — The body of Saint Dominic was solemnly translated on Saturday from the provisional tomb where it had been placed for security reasons in 1943, to its former resting place in the Cathedral of Bologna.

There it will be exposed for veneration until September 15 and then solemnly entombed in the original tomb.

His Eminence Giovanni Battista Cardinal Nardini, Archbishop of Bologna, will function as Papal Legate at the ceremonies. The Most Rev. M. S. Gillet, O.P., Master-General of the Dominicans, many electors who have come from all parts of the world to Rome to attend the forthcoming general chapter of the Dominicans representatives of the Franciscans and Carmelites are also expected to be present at the ceremony.

Public high schools will release their pupils for religious instructions for the first time this fall on Monday, Sept. 20 at 1:40 p. m. allowing them to go to their own parishes for instructions on school time. Parish priests will conduct the classes.

Pupils may enroll in the release time classes by signing a "release card" signed by the parents and returning the card to the school principal. The public high school will have a supply of cards.

Rev. George C. Vogt, pastor of the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine, reminds all Catholic parents of their obligation to enroll public school children for religious classes.

All Catholic pupils will follow the same religion course subject of which this year is "The Sacraments, the Mass and the Liturgical Year." Texts are to be obtained at the parish office. Examinations are usual in January and distributed in February and are from the Confraternity office. Passing grades will qualify for school credit towards graduation.

Public grade schools must also sign "release cards" and send them to the principal. Parish priests always have a large supply of these cards.

Last year over 23,000 Catholic pupils of public schools in the diocese of Rochester were given religious instructions on "release time." This year Father Vogt and the Confraternity office hope to reach every Catholic child in the public schools.
