'Release Time' to Begin, Parents Reminded of Duty.

Public high schools will release their pupils for religious instructions for the first time this fall on Monday, Sept. 23 at 2:40 p. m. allowing them to go to their own parishes for instructions on school time. Parish priests will conduct the classes.

All Catholic pupils will follow the same religious course, subject of which this year is "The Sacraments, the Mass and the Liturgical Year." Texts may be obtained at the parish center. Examinations as usual will be distributed in January and June from the Confraternity office. Passing grades will qualify for school credit towards graduation.

Parents of children in the public grade schools must also see release cards and send them to the principal. Parish priests always have a large supply of these cards. Last year over 21,000 Catholic pupils of public schools in the Diocese of Rochester were given religious instructions on "release time." This year Father Vogt and the Confraternity office hope to reach every Catholic child in the public schools.

Pupils may enroll in the release time classes by obtaining a "release card" signed by their parents and returning the card to the school principal. Each public high school will have a supply of cards.

Rev. George C. Vogt, director of the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine, reminds all Catholic parents of their obligation to enroll public school children for religious classes.
