### Bishop Welcomes Whitefriars To Diocese at Monastery Rite

Auburn—Whitefriars Monastery, new novitiate of the Carmelite Fathers and formerly the Case mansion on South Street, was dedicated here on Saturday in special ceremonies conducted by His Excellency Bishop Kearney who officially welcomed the Carmelites, or Whitefriars as they are popularly styled, to the Diocese of Rochester.

Rev. Patrick W. Russell, O. Carm., superior of the new monastery, who preached the dedication sermon, recalled that there was a good historic precedent for Bishop Kearney's invitation to the Whitefriars to come to the diocese of Rochester.

"Exactly 200 years ago," he stated, "his Lordship, the Bishop of Rochester in England, appealed to his clergy and his people to hasten to the Carmelites newly-come to his diocese."

Speaking in the presence of the Bishop, clergy, religious and Auburn city officials, including Mayor Edward T. Kelly, Father Russell traced the history of the Carmelites and explained their purpose in coming to Auburn.

"These young men," he said, "will be trained in the way of God, according to the Carmelite Rule and according to the Carmelite traditions. The work that you have helped us to begin here today will reach out through the years, in God's mercy, to help many souls."

"May the great Patroness of our Order, Our Lady of Mount Carmel," Father Russell concluded, "bless the Whitefriars and may she help us to use this happy moment."

In his address of welcome to the Friars Bishop Kearney hailed their advent in Auburn as a new source of blessing to all the people of the city.

"We realize," he said, "that where a group of priests gather they can not confine themselves to the limits of the building alone. Their presence will be felt in the community."

"Every priest will have new blessings every day will have increased spiritual strength. The Carmelites come into a community to bring God's love."

Bishop Kearney compared the new monastery to the planting of a bed of roses, saying: "You can not plant a bed of roses and confine the stems of the flowers to one side of the fence. It is bound to flow over to the other side. Auburn and the Diocese of Rochester will be richer for generations to come with the dedication of this Carmelite house."

Highlight of the dedication ceremony was the placing of a new crucifix over the main entrance of the monastery. The crucifix, designed by the Church Studio in New York was presented as a gift to the monastery by Bishop Kearney.
