

Bp. O'Brien Wallace Speaks As Blow at Fair

Wallace Speaks
The proposal of Secretary of State Wallace to give Soviet Russia a special status in Europe would mean the abandonment of the 50-50 rule of Atlantic neutrality.

Secretary of State Wallace made the change in an address last Sunday evening at St. Vincent's church of the Holy Spirit in New York. He was speaking at the request of the Russian Relief League.

In the same address he supported the government's policy under which Russian refugees have been taken up in 50,000 families in the United States.

The Russian Relief League is a group of Americans who are working for the relief of Russian refugees in the United States. It is a non-profit organization that has been active since the beginning of the war.

Secretary of State Wallace said in his speech that he was supporting the government's policy of taking up 50,000 Russian refugees in the United States. He said that this was a necessary step to help the Russian people who were suffering because of the war.

Wallace's speech was a direct challenge to the Communist Party's demand for a special status for the Soviet Union. He said that the government would not support such a demand because it would mean the abandonment of the 50-50 rule of Atlantic neutrality.

Wallace's speech was widely reported in the press and caused a great deal of discussion. The Communist Party was particularly angered by his remarks and threatened further action.

The speech was also a significant statement in support of the government's policy of aiding Russian refugees. It showed that the majority of Americans were in favor of this policy.

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Former Seminary Aide Asks Assumption Definition

Washington — (NC) — A petition addressed to His Holiness Pope Pius XII by the newly organized Catholic Theological Society of America in favor of a definition of the doctrine of Our Lady's Assumption has been presented to His Excellency Archbishop Amleto Giovanni Cicognani, Apostolic Delegate to the United States, by the Very Rev. Joseph C. Fenton, editor of The American Ecclesiastical Review and secretary of the Theological Society.

Presentation of the petition was decided upon at the inaugural meeting of the society held in New York at the invitation and under the patronage of Cardinal Spellman. The Rev. John F. X. Sweeney, S.J., of the College of the Sacred Heart, Baltimore, sponsored the move to make the petition. The Sisters of St. Francis of Sylvania, O., offered to print the formula on parchment. The petition is signed for the society by its President, the Very Rev. Francis J. Connell, C.S.S.R., and by Father

The petition reads in part: "We are aware of the fact that the incomparable Virgin Mother's story has been recounted with many precious pearls throughout the centuries, from the promulgation of her divine maternity at Ephesus up to this time of the most recent definition of the Immaculate Conception."
