Debt Removal To Be Observed at Mt. Carmel Mass

A Solemn High Mass of Thanksgiving marking the complete removal of the church indebtedness will be offered in Our Lady of Mt. Carmel Church, Rochester, on Sunday, Sept. 22.

The Alumni of the school which number 1,432 will assist at the Mass in a body. At the conclusion of the church services the mortgage will be burned by the two lay trustees, Charles J. Dispenza and James G. D'Amico.

Our Lady of Mt. Carmel parish was founded in 1909 by the late Most Rev. Thomas F. Hickey, second Bishop of Rochester, to serve the population of Italian descent on the east side of the city.

A combination building was erected, which was used as church and school until 1929 when the present edifice was built on Woodward St. by the Rev. Walter A. Forry, pastor, now Bishop of Syracuse. A debt of \$46,000 was assumed at the time.

The parish was successively administered by these pastors: the Rev. Oreste Canali, the Rev. Victor Rossi, the now Most Rev. Walter A. Forry, the Rev. Gerald T. Brennan and the present pastor, Father Azzi, who took over when the debt was \$41,100 in 1937.

Participants in 1943 pledged to remove the debt gradually by popular subscription with extra monthly contributions. Recent attainment of the goal has occasioned the Mass of Thanksgiving.

Father Azzi will preach in Italian at the Mass and the Rev. Joseph A. Cirincione, pastor of St. Francis Assisi Church and a former member of the parish will preach in English.

FATHER RANDALL TO PREACH AT MARYKNOLL RITE

Rev. John S. Randall, director of the Rochester Diocesan Office of the Society for the Propagation of the Faith, will deliver the address for the impressive Departure Ceremony of the Foreign Mission Sisters of St. Dominic Sunday, Sept. 23, at Onalaska.

The ceremony will begin at 3:30 p. m. on the grounds of the Motherhouse of the Maryknoll Sisters with the chanting of the Itinerarium, the Church's official prayer before a journey.

Following Father Randall's address, mission crosses will be presented to the Sisters and their assignments "to mission posts in the United States and abroad will be read.

Vows of poverty, chastity and obedience will be renewed by the departing Sisters in the presence of their relatives and friends before the ceremony is concluded with Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament.

The Sisters will be stationed in various Maryknoll Centers in the United States and in mission posts in Central and South America, Hawaii, Manchuria, Japan, the Philippines and China.

In some instances, Sisters will return to mission fields which they were forced to abandon when repatriated to the United States during World War II.

Four of the Sisters have elected to give their lives to prayer and contemplation in the Maryknoll Cloister, "The Regina Coeli House," adjoining the Maryknoll Motherhouse.

Founded in 1912, the order sent its first group of Maryknoll Sisters to the Orient in 1921. In the last quarter of a century, each year has sent larger groups going out to the mission fields to take up their work of catechizing, ministering to the sick, teaching in elementary and secondary schools, doing social service work and training young girls for native Sisterhoods.

Msgr. Sheen Cites Three To Avert Threatening Perils

Auburn - "The Signs of the Times" point to the approaching danger of war or catastrophe, according to Monsignor Fulton J. Sheen, who addressed a gathering of 1,700 in the Emerson Auditorium of East High School, on Sunday.

Making his 25th annual appearance here under the auspices of the Lyceum League of St. Mary's Church, the noted Catholic orator stated that in the present situation "there are three ways out for us: Revolution, Revelation and Repentance."

Mr. Paul Meyer, local civic leader, introduced Monsignor Sheen, and the Rev. E. Leo McManus, chairman of the institute committee, expressed appreciation to those who assisted in the arrangements for Monsignor Sheen's appearance.

Interpreting the "Signs of the Times," as he entitled his address, Monsignor Sheen began by stating: "This will be a serious discussion. I have chosen the particular title because of the words which Our Blessed Lord used in answering the Pharisees and Sadducees when they asked Him to give them a sign. He answered them by saying: 'You are able to read the signs of the weather but you are not able to read the signs of the times!'"

"Do you realize that war has been going on since 1914, and that there is danger of a third world war, that something not too good is in the future? There are signs of the times. In the international order, our justice, morality and God are not mentioned in the United Nations' Charter. There is no ethical concept of justice. In the social order we know that in major cities of the United States there is one divorce for every two marriages. One half of the marriages end in divorce. This is a degradation, a shock to our national life. We feel we are not secure because we are ethnically and racially divided. This permeation is a warning for what finally will happen."
