It has been superior because it is Christian. When it ceases to be Christian it loses its superiority. We have lost it. We are in the minority of the world. The East can look to Russia. The East is lost to the West because we refused to give that which made us truly great, and that is a danger. They resent us and now with a new leader and a new inspiration they resent us more.

The fourth reason is Russia itself. Russia is bent on world revolution. It has always been. I have always affirmed that America has not in the past understood Russia. We actually judged Russia by Stalin or by the press. I have always maintained that Communism is intrinsically wicked, the greatest menace to the world. Our sixtieth birthday, Stalin said: "Never again will I formally celebrate my birthday until we have established world revolution. I am willing to shed my blood drop by drop if it need be to establish world revolution." From July 1930 until August 1945 Russia broke 27 treaties. Every nation that fought save one has decreased its army. Russia has twelve million men under arms. For what?
