**Maryknoll Nuns Hear
Fr. Randall Cite
Role in World Peace**

Maryknoll—The mantle of peace is bursting at the seams and even now the seeds of World War III are taking root," the Rev. John S. Randall, Director of the Rochester Diocesan Office of the Society for the Propagation of the Faith, told 1500 Maryknoll sisters and guests at the 39th departure ceremony Sunday at Ossining.

Sister M. Edward Marston Wilson of Canandaigua was among the 62 Foreign Mission Sisters of St. Dominic, largest group of Maryknoll missionaries ever assigned, who received mission crosses at the ceremonies presided over by Bishop Raymond A. Lanza, recently elected Superior General of Maryknoll, Clive Way St. Peter.

Speaking in the "restored" gardens of the Maryknoll motherhouse, Father Randall declared: "Never will there be any peace until mankind learns to kneel with these Sisters at the feet of the Master and there learn that real peace and happiness consist not in power, nor influence, nor education, nor wealth, nor prestige, but in love, love of God and love of our neighbor."

Taking issue with those who would "consider the sacrifice of these nuns wasteful," Father Randall reminded his audience: "We have just concluded the most terrifying war in the history of the human race—more than thirteen months have passed since the guns were silenced, but what of the world at this moment? Would any man be so blind to hear us to say that we have peace?"

Gathering at Hotel Sheraton, the thirty priests representing all branches of the armed forces and home from battlefronts in various parts of the world, through their spokesman, paid high tribute to Father Casey's keeping them informed of activities on the home front.

Speakers extolled the completeness of Father Casey's monthly bulletins and the intimate accounts which brought home to the priests serving fighting men in battle action and at far flung posts where chaplains needed contacts with home to keep up their spirits.
