

# Veterans CWV Post

The War Veterans Post organized in the city of Auburn, Sept. 30 when 110 veterans of World War I were sworn into the post. The post is the only one of its kind in the city and is the only one in the county to have received a charter from the United States Veterans' Administration.

The first official meeting of the newly established Catholic War Veterans' Post is scheduled Monday, Oct. 14, at 8 p. m. in Our Lady of Mount Carmel hall.

Rev. John F. Wolsch, former U. S. Navy Chaplain of World War II, now assistant pastor of Holy Family Church, attended the organizational meeting, addressing words of encouragement to the new post membership and closing the gathering with a prayer.

## Ireland's Faith Held Reason for UN Ban

Dublin — (RNS) — The real reason for Russia's veto of Ireland's application for membership in the United Nations is that Ireland is a Catholic country, "whose moral strength ever would be on the side of Catholic principles and justice for all peoples," according to the official correspondence of the Irish ambassador, T. E. Fogarty, Dublin.

The commentator recalled that Premier Stalin, at the League of Nations Assembly in 1939, did not oppose the entry of Russia into the League, but as soon as the League became a member of the United Nations, he should guarantee complete religious freedom in Russia.

# Priest Directs Boys' Town Choir

Leader and director of the Boys' Town Choir which will sing at Eastman Theater on Monday, Oct. 21, is the Rev. Francis P. Schmitt, who has been largely responsible for the phenomenal success of the choir in recent years.

Under his able direction the choir has grown from 35 to 100 voices, although the number of voices for the 1946 concert tour, first in Boys' Town history, was limited to 40 as traveling accommodations could be obtained more easily.

Father Schmitt was ordained in 1941 and upon his ordination was assigned to Boys' Town as an assistant to the Rev. Mr. Magr. Edward J. Flanagan, founder and director of Boys' Town. Father Schmitt formerly was assistant organist at St. Lawrence Preparatory School, St. Catharines, Wis., and at St. Paul's Seminary, St. Paul, Minn., he studied under Don Francis Missia.

That the current tour will be an outstanding success was proved in the choir's opening concert at St. Paul last Sunday night. More than 2,000 persons, one of the largest audiences ever to attend a musical event in that city, turned out for the concert.

The choir's coming Rochester appearance already has attracted wide interest throughout the community, especially among Catholic groups. The Most Rev. James E. Kearney, Bishop of Rochester, will attend the concert as a guest of the Catholic Music Association, it was learned this week. Others of the clergy, particularly those with special interest in music and in character-building work and self-government program of Boys' Town, are planning to attend.

Three soloists are featured with the choir. They are Francis Rizzo, Johnny James and Ramon Esparza. Youngest of them is 12-year-old Johnny James, an eighth grader, who finds time, in addition to his music and his studies, for Boy Scout work, football, basketball, swimming, boxing and baseball.
