

Religious War Prophesied by Monsignor Sheen

The world is facing the most terrible religious war of its history, the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Fulton J. Sheen of the Catholic University of America, opening the Christian Culture Lecture Series at Aquinas Institute, prophesied here.

"The next world conflict," the noted orator declared, "will not, as many believe, occur between Russia and the Western world as such. The opponents will be the Marxian man-God and the Christian God-man."

Monsignor Sheen debunked the popular notion that Russia is opposed to Western, so-called Christian, civilization. This could not be so, he pointed out, because both have too much in common.

Compares 2 Worlds

He compared the Western world that is "bourgeois and materialistic, that believes man is an animal and lives for the sake of profit," to Russian Marxist communism, citing parallels from the Soviet constitution.

"We must make the distinction between the western world that is Christian and believes in human persons and the Western world that dates back to the rationalists of the French Revolution," the speaker explained.

He decried the lukewarmness and indifference of Christians who are almost indistinguishable in practice from the materialists.

"There has been a retreat from the religious passion of the first Easter. The pentecostal flames have gone out and the world will soon be in darkness."

Youth's Quest

Modern youth is not going to be content with an ideology which lacks passion and purpose, he warned. Youth is looking for something absolute with which to fight evil.

Calling attention to the fervor of the communists, he averred: "Passion is back and they have it; we have the truth and no more."

Future Hopeful Write Bishops in Messages For Mission Sunday

A "radiant future" is in prospect for missionaries in the far-flung outposts of Catholicism, the Rev. John S. Randall, diocesan director, Society for the Propagation of the Faith, states in calling diocesan attention to the approach of Mission Sunday (October 20).

Father Randall states: "Sunday, October 20, is Mission Sunday throughout the Catholic World. This is the day in the year set aside by His Holiness, for us to contribute to the cause of the Missions. Last February, Monsignor McDonnell, the National Director of the Society for the Propagation of the Faith had an audience with the Holy Father. At that time, Pope Pius XII thanked America for its generous support of the missions, and then said, 'So much today depends upon generous America.'"

Everywhere the missionaries are busy clearing away material ruins and rebuilding moral ones. And everywhere their spirit is equal to the occasion. They have fixed their gaze not on the sombre past, but on the radiant future that lies before them.

One Bishop in China writes: "We continue doing our duty and are kept busy at the urgent task of forming good Christians and organizing Christian communities, trusting ever in the help of the Lord, which cannot fail us, and to the subsidies and alms we look forward to receiving soon."

From Indo-China a Bishop writes: "Our Father X was pilloried and was put in the stocks and was exposed to the broiling sun from high noon till five o'clock in the evening, his spirit three days on one meal. He was forced to go street-sweeping and act as a water-carrier. He was beaten and imprisoned under threat of death to deny the Faith. But he remained firm and was even beyond himself with joy at the expectation of a Cardinal."

The life story of His Eminence, Thomas Cardinal Tien, will be of interest to all in Rochester. Cardinal Tien visited this city on April 13 of this year. Cardinal Tien is the first Chinese priest ever to be elevated to the cardinalate. It is said to be most interesting to hear how this little Chinese orphan, who was raised and educated by missionaries working in China, devoted his life to God and was later elevated to the dignity of a Cardinal.
