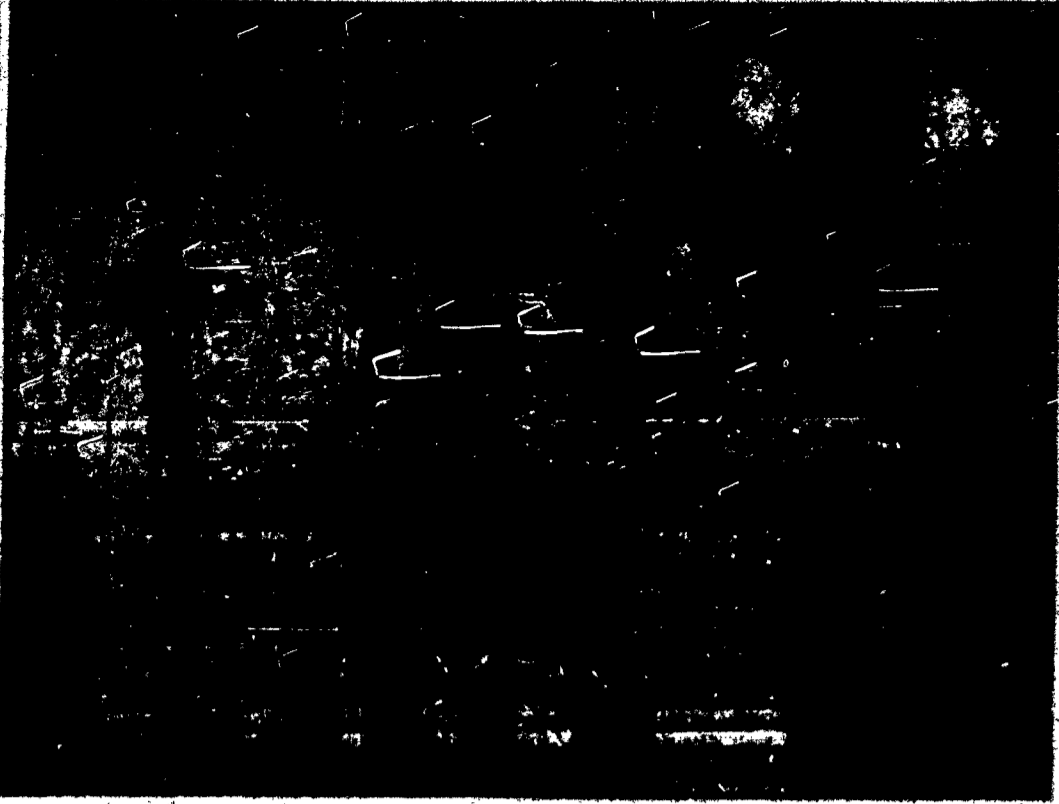

Despotism Perils U. S. Editor Tells K. of C.

Corning - Speaking at the Columbus Day dinner of the Corning Council, Knights of Columbus, in the Baroni Steuben Hotel, Tuesday evening, the Rev. Patrick J. Flynn, associate editor of the Catholic Courier-Journal, warned that American democracy is not secure as long as there are men anywhere who are victims of despotism.

He was introduced by the Rev. Thomas K. Cleary, assistant pastor of St. Patrick's Church and chaplain of the Corning K. of C. Council.

Calling for serious devotion to the cause of world peace, Father Flynn told his hearers that those who work for peace serve both God and country.

"Just as Columbus, the Catholic, was in the vanguard of those who once sought the New World, so today, Catholics, the co-religionists of the brave admiral, should be in the front ranks of those who seek to discover the new world of lasting peace," he said.

"The United States has our Church been in the vanguard of world peace," he continued, "that the modern world has been heralded as the 'Age of Peace'."

Changing that there are millions of people, particularly behind the Iron Curtain, who do not yet enjoy freedom, Father Flynn warned, "We must not be indifferent to these people because they live a few thousand miles from our shores."

"If we are sincerely dedicated to the service of God and America, then we must not blunder into the attitude that it does not matter what happens as long as it does not happen to us."

"It is the duty of sincere peace-makers," he stated, "to speak out in defense of Archbishop Stepinac who has been despotically seized by the Tito government of Yugoslavia. The brave archbishop is the heroic symbol of all those who now suffer under the cruel heel of Red tyranny."

"We understand why those who once spoke loudly against Nazism are now silent about persecuted Catholics in Yugoslavia. We are puzzled, too, by the silence of our Fourth of July orators."
