Sodalities of Our Lady And the Missions

Mission Sunday reminds Sodalities of one of the finest and most practical means of fulfilling the second great aim of the Sodality, the spread of their good influence for the benefit of others. It has been a characteristic of Sodalities from the very beginning to take up what seemed to be most needed and most fruitful for their neighbor and the Church. Outside its traditional activities, the Sodality finds an endlessly rich and varied field of apostolic activity. And the mission, where a thousand million pagans are "seated in darkness and the shadow of death" and where thousands of missionaries plead for help to rebuild their war-destroyed churches, schools and hospitals, offers year-round opportunity for Catholic action in the conversion of the heathen.

The global war, so recently ended, in no wise compares with the great world war raging over the whole earth and extending from Golgotha's ghastly to the final coming of Christ the King in triumphant judgment. It is the struggle of light with darkness, of Christianity with error and sin and paganism.

To spread the "Truth of Christ's Church, to extend His Kingdom over the whole earth is the vocation of every Catholic, but in a very special way the vocation of every Sodalite. "Our Lady's Sodality," Rule 12 states, "aims at extending their members' salutary influence for the good of others." This rule, mentioning specific activities common to the Sodality, extends itself quite naturally to mission projects.

Zeal for Missions

To limit their attention to their own narrow circle of vision and not to see the vast harvest fields of the earth, ripe for reaping, is for the Sodalite to be wanting in a deep sense of Catholic understanding and apostolic zeal. To forget the millions of uneducated souls so ignorant of the joy of the true Faith is to utterly forgo the great love God has shown them in the free gift of Faith.

Bp. Muench Sees Acute DP Problem

Fargo, N. D. — (NC)—Bishop Aloisius J. Muench of Fargo, Apostle, Visitor in Germany, underscored the acuteness of the DP problem in a letter to the Catholic Action News, monthly publication of the Fargo Diocese.

"Among displaced persons and refugees, thousands of families have been torn apart; husbands are separated from their wives and children from their parents," Bishop Muench wrote. "Charity bureaus are set up everywhere. Lists of lost persons are circulated and public places, while over the radio the names of persons for whom search is made are read."

"Charity organizations are using all means available to bring separated family members together again," he added. "Between five and six million men are still held as prisoners of war, chiefly in France and Russia. This adds to the gravity of the family problem. The rebuilding of family life is doubtless the most important problem facing Germany today."
