

Catholics Denounce Anti-British Charges

London, Northern Ireland — Charges by Sir Basil Brooke, Prime Minister of Northern Ireland, that the Roman Catholic Church in Ireland has been "unwillingly and unthinkingly" assisting the British in their "unjust" war against Germany, have created indignation in Catholic circles here and in other parts of the world.

The Premier's statement was made in a speech in the House of Commons on Tuesday, October 22, 1946. He is the head of a Protestant majority in the House of Commons.

It was the biggest act of defiance by a Protestant leader towards Catholics, reinforced by arguments such as his, which drew the contempt of Cardinal Griffin (Archbishop of Westminster) a couple of years ago on religious intolerance in Northern Ireland.

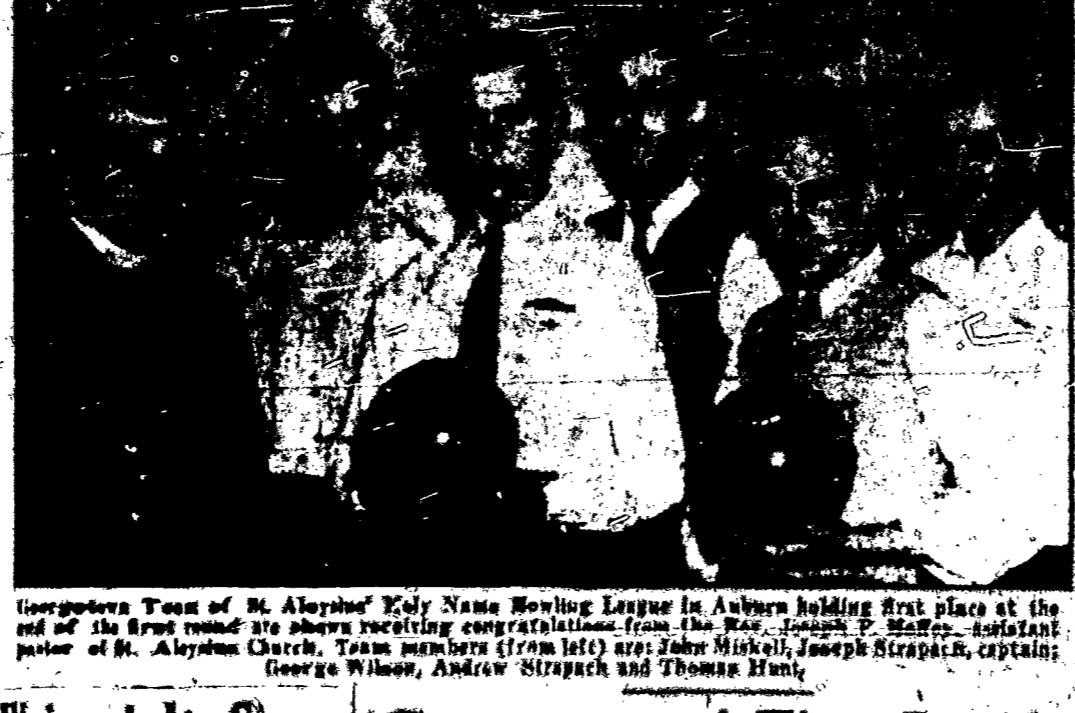
Cardinal Griffin is not a British citizen. He is the head of a Catholic Church in England.

"Neither Sir Basil Brooke nor any of his colleagues," said the Rev. Fr. John J. Sheehan, "can point to a single speech by any religious leader of the Catholic Church asking for a boycott of Protestants, or a withdrawal of their support from the Government."

It was the biggest act of defiance by a Protestant leader towards Catholics, reinforced by arguments such as his, which drew the contempt of Cardinal Griffin (Archbishop of Westminster) a couple of years ago on religious intolerance in Northern Ireland.

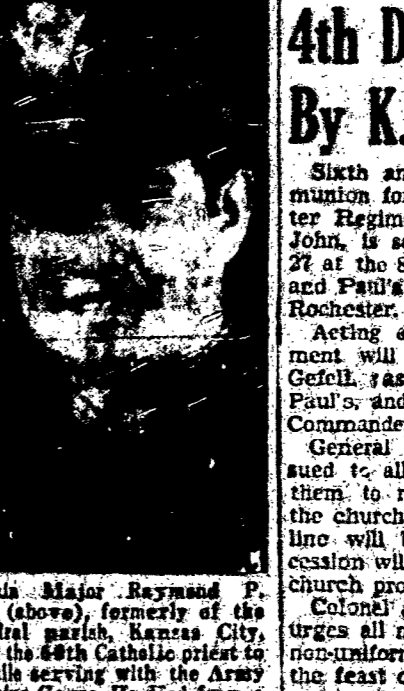

New York — (NC) — Bishop Louis L. K. Morrow of Kingston, preparing to return to his diocese after spending a year in the United States, will take with him, all the money left over from his trip to India, including books, school supplies, books, religious articles, and treatments he can collect.

Bishop Morrow made this announcement at the Rectory of St. Mary's of Christ the King in New York City, where he described the suffering and need in the 100 villages and cities of the Bengal diocese, visited by him in 1943 and especially suffering from poverty and pestilence. The Bishop said that the people of the country, who are a mixture of Hindu and Mohammedan, could only use the supplies brought in from the United States.

GERMANY REPORTS REVIVAL OF FAITH
