Abp. Stepinac Protest Adopted By 4th Degree

Protesting the imprisonment of Archbishop Stepinac, members of Rochester Fourth Degree Assembly, Knights of Columbus on Thursday evening in a meeting at Columbus Civic Centre adopted a resolution to be sent to their Congressmen, the State Department and the K. of C. national headquarters.

Text of the resolution follows:
Whereas:
America has always stood for and fought for justice and freedom of worship; and
Whereas:
The Knights of Columbus has been organized and founded for the express purpose of safeguarding these rights, and the Christian principles on which they rest; and
Whereas:
Justice has been flagrantly violated, and whereas:
Freedom of worship, and all rights which our nation holds dear, have been denied the Yugoslavs in the prosecution and conviction of Archbishop Stepinac;

Be It Resolved that the Rochester Fourth Degree Assembly of the Knights of Columbus protest the action of the Tito Government against Archbishop Stepinac and the people of Yugoslavia.
Be it also resolved that this resolution be passed by the Fourth Degree Assembly of the Knights of Columbus, and forwarded to the National Headquarters of the Knights of Columbus and the duly authorized representatives of the American government.

Culture Series Lecture Set by Burma Surgeon

Gordon S. Seagrave, M.D., famed Burma surgeon, will be heard in the Aquinas Christian Culture Series, Sunday evening, Nov. 3 at Aquinas Institute auditorium, 1127 Dewey Ave. at 8:15 p. m.

The Christian Culture Series is in its sixth season under the direction of the Rev. Hugh Hatley, C.S.B., vice principal of Aquinas Institute.
Doctor Seagrave's career has taken him from Johns Hopkins Medical School to Nambikars in the Shan country of the Northern Burma jungle. For 25 years, uncareful for human beings numbering millions, famine, pestilence, and ignorance kept this distinguished medical missionary in that far east country.
The war found him medical officer of the Burma Road, attached to the late General Joseph Stilwell's army. His experiences have given him a background few lecturers possess, Father Hatley points out.

The Burma Surgeon is author of a book by that title and of another "Burma Surgeon Returns."

Bishop Arnold, CWV Speaker, to Meet Chaplains

Coming for the public presentation of a Catholic War Veterans charter to Holy Rosary Memorial Post, the Most Rev. William R. Arnold, Military Delegate, will be guest of His Excellency, Bishop Kearney at a noon luncheon, Monday, Nov. 4.

Bishop Arnold will be greeted at the luncheon in Hotel Sheraton by approximately 25 American former chaplains of the Army, Navy and Marine Corps who will be the Bishop's guests. The luncheon will begin at 12:30 p. m.

In the evening at Aquinas Institute, Bishop Arnold will speak at the Charter presentation program and the Memorial services for the 10 boys of Holy Rosary parish who made the supreme sacrifice in World War II. The program will begin at 8 p. m. according to the Rev. John S. Whelan, Chaplain of Holy Rosary Memorial Post, Catholic War Veterans.

Former Chief of Chaplains of the United States Army, Bishop Arnold is a graduate of St. Bernard's Seminary. He served in the Army for 30 years rising to the rank of Major General. He is Grand Bishop of Michigan and Delegate to the Military Ordinance.

The distinguished priest will be presented at the Catholic War Veterans exercises by the Rev. Rev. Charles E. Spay, pastor of Holy Rosary Church. Post Commander David Duggan will accept the Charter for the CWV post.

Fr. Cuddy Gives College Retreat

Rev. Paul J. Cuddy, recently appointed by His Excellency Bishop Kearney in the post of Catholic Chaplain at Bangor College, conducted a three-day retreat this week at Good County College, White Plains, N. Y.

As a former Army Chaplain who served in the European theater, Father Cuddy wishes to promote retreats for American war veterans. Through his efforts, three-day retreats for American troops were conducted earlier this year in three different places in Germany.
