Your Pharmacist

Excerpt from the CODE OF ETHICS American Pharmaceutical Association

PHARMACY has for its primary object the service which it can render to the public in safeguarding the handling, sale, compounding and dispensing of medicinal substances. The practice of pharmacy demands knowledge, skill and integrity on the part of those engaged in it. Pharmacists are required to pass certain educational tests in order to qualify under the laws of their states. In return the state exacts the pharmacist to recognize his responsibility to the community and to fulfill his professional obligations honestly and with due regard for the physical and moral well-being of society. He should neither buy nor sell adulterated drugs for use which are in any way connected with medicinal purposes. The pharmacist should hold the health and safety of his patients to be of first consideration.

Holy Family Year Book Wins National Honors

Auburn—The 1944 ACHILLEAN, Holy Family High School Yearbook, has achieved honors in Publication Contest. It received a first place rating in the Columbia Press Association, according to the announcement recently made at the Yearbook Conference at Columbia University. This rating signifies distinction in various phases of yearbook production; such as theme, layout, photography, printing, engraving, and the quality of the book as a whole.

The Achillean also captured all Catholic honors in the Catholic Press Association Contest. It was accredited for its definition of Catholic thought and promotion of Catholic activity, feature coverage, physical appearance, photography, layout and design.

Member of the 1947 Achillean Staff, together with a chairman, Miss Margaret Quigley, and two faculty members will attend the Press Conference at Syracuse, under the auspices of the Empire State School Press Association on November 1 and 2.

37 MISSIONARIES ARRIVE IN JAPAN

Tokyo (Cable, NC) — The first large Mission sent to Japan since the war has arrived at Yokohama. In the group are 37 nuns, one priest and one Brother. Fourteen of the nuns are from the United States, 10 being Notre Dame de Namur Sisters from Wattham, Mass., and four Sacred-Heart Sisters from Albany. The other nuns are from Canada.

It is interesting to note that two of the Sacred Heart Sisters and one of the Notre Dame nuns are native Japanese. They are converts to the Faith who made their novitiate in the United States and were forced to remain in the country while the war was in progress.

Canadian Bishops Score Conviction

Toronto — (RNS) — The trial and conviction of Archbishop Louis Sierpina of Zagreb were denounced here by James Cardinal McGuigan, Archbishop of Toronto as "an outrage on justice." The Cardinal led the trial of the Yugoslav prelate, was discussed at the recent conference of Canadian archbishops and bishops and that his statement "can speak for all of them."

Bishop Sees New Era For Faith in China

New York — (NC) — Chiang Kai Shek's emphasis on the need for Christianity "in every speech he made during the war" has had a "wonderful effect" on the Chinese people and the future of the faith in China is bright with promise, according to Bishop Francis X. Ford, M.M., of Kaying, South China.

International Court Appeal Demanded

Cleveland — (NC) — The immediate appeal of the case of Archbishop Alois Stepinac to the International Court of Justice was recommended here by Representative Michael Reighan of Ohio, in a speech in which he referred to the apprehension he noticed among Catholics toward the Tito regime when he visited Belgrade in 1945.

"Transferring this trial to the jurisdiction of the International Court would, I may mention, fall in with the expressed desires of the Yugoslav hierarchy," the congressman declared. "As far back as the Fall of 1943, the Bishops of Croatia issued a pastoral letter which I can only call prophetic. In it they denounced 'the bitter persecution of the Catholic Church in Yugoslavia' and urged that representatives of other nations be named on an international commission to conduct trials of persons accused as 'war criminals.'"

Hungarian Officials At Wine Feast Mass

Budapest — (Radio, NC) — The President of the Hungarian Republic, Zoltan Tildy, and the Hungarian Prime Minister, Ferenc Nagy, and several foreign diplomats were among those who attended the Solemn Mass marking the feast of Hungarian wine in the famous wine producing district of Tokaj. Bishop Stephen Maderasz of Kassa, who preached the sermon, said that Hungary has always been a citadel of Christianity. "From time immemorial the Hungarians have been Christians, he stated, and they intend to remain so even at the cost of their blood."
