### New British School Law Is Denounced

London (NC) - Britain's 1944 Education Act came under fire again from Archbishop Richard Downey of Liverpool, speaking at a "welcome home" dinner for 180 Catholic teachers who have been discharged from the armed forces.

"This present folly," said the Archbishop, "cannot go on. Give us a national system of education with equal opportunities for every boy and girl. What a wonderful thing it would be. I think it will come, though perhaps not in my time or yours."

"Anyway, we are going on fighting until it does come. We are not satisfied with the present measure and we will carry on until our children are not penalized for a belief in definite religious principles."

"It is a calamity that Ministers of Education get into political parties. They never have time to get to know their job."

As it stands, the Education Act gives equal opportunities for education to every child. Catholics, however, who want their own schools, must pay a large part of the cost. The Act has also laid down new standards for school buildings and all schools must be brought up to these standards. This means that if Catholics wish to keep their schools they are faced with a crippling financial burden.

In a recent pastoral Archbishop Downey said that the Education Act would cost the Catholic Church some eight million dollars to recognize the diocesan schools in conformity with the Act.

### Sodality of Our Lady

#### A Timely Activity

Our Sodality often times need suggestions for interesting and practical projects. Although the National Sodality Office supplies us with unlimited ideas for practical activity, yet very often we pass over these simply because they are so manifold. Thus, I on occasion will seize upon a worthy project which will apply to the Sodality's program and assist our Sodality leaders in offering a brighter and more definite program. The coming week, known as National Catholic Book Week, is one of them. Originated by two zealous Catholics, Doctor Fitzgerald of the Catholic Library Association and Charles L. Higgins, this week was planned, not as a campaign to sell books, but as a systematic campaign of publicity to introduce the average Catholic to literature of his own splendid tradition. To foster good reading is a real apostolic work and there is very deep to the great fundamental work of the Sodality, National Catholic Book Week, there can well be the focus point of fine intellectual activity for the Sodality.

**Practice Plan**

The real words of a Sodality comes in that it makes the spiritual world and clear. It helps the Sodality to satisfy itself and its neighbor and to defend the Church. The Sodality will be best when it will work at it only when he sees that it is worthwhile. Now this is beyond the power of the Sodality. Thus the Sodality will have to use his intellect and his understanding. And he is not going to be able to use his mind intelligently or readily if he doesn't have the practice. He will get that practice and exercise from the reading of books.

Sodalities need topics for thought. They need information. Without reading, and in particular without reading books they are not going to develop thought or obtain useful and necessary information. Sodalities will build the future only as they plan the future. And this can be done only if they go through the labor of hard, intellectual work, namely reading, thinking, discussing and then acting. The training ground for the mind, as well as the source of food for the mind will be found in books. A number of excellent plans for this have been offered by the various services of the Sodality National Office. If carefully planned and executed they will produce one of the Sodality's most interesting literary and spiritual projects of the year.

First, there are our libraries. Naturally our own Rochester Catholic Evidence Library comes first. Begun and maintained principally through the efforts of Father Dominic Egan, one of Rochester's most apostolic prelates, this library has done magnificent service in providing good reading for all Catholics and in offering to visit the "speakers" through its unpretentious parlorhouse of the apostolate. Too, they should make it known to others through the Sodality's channels of publicity and encourage others to make use of this library.

**Cooperating With Libraries**

Then, we have the public libraries. If our Catholic people, particularly Sodalities, who patronize the public libraries would see to it that these libraries carry Catholic books, then we would be able to spread the cause of good reading to the exclusion of many of the harmful, trashy books that are being published these days. Too, our Sodalities would have to make the practice of seeing that these books are loaned out, thus creating the demand that will keep them on the open and active shelves where they can be available to all. Sodalities also could distribute lists of Catholic books available to Catholic borrowers at the public libraries.

Catholic Book Week should not pass without each Sodality sponsoring an exhibit of Catholic books. Jacket designs of books from one or more of the books, collection of photos of various authors, reviews and advertising ideas from publishers are all practical suggestions for such an exhibit. Literature and vocational material would also prove useful. And an invitation to the whole parish to visit the exhibit would be the climax.

To get your Sodality working on such a project as National Catholic Book Week, to sponsor an activity that would stir our people to a realization of the fine Catholic books that are readily available to all, to foster a growth of good reading would surely be fulfilling every aim and purpose of the Sodality. We recommend a study of this activity and an immediate attempt to work it into your Sodality program for November.

"In the reorganization to follow, I trust that all societies of Catholic women will join this admirable federation established by the Bishops of our country, for, while respecting the pastoral autonomy of each affiliated group, the N. C. C. W. serves admirably to inform, instruct, and guide along the lines set down by His Holiness, Pope Pius XII," the Bishop's letter states.

Hungary's Apostle Honored Budapest (NC) - A gathering of 150,000 Catholics, thousands of them farming, took place in Hungary, assembled to celebrate the 100th anniversary of the martyrdom of St. Gerard, "Apostle of the Hungarians," Josef Cardinal Mindszenty, Primate of Hungary, addressed the throng.
