Culture Series Lecture Set by Burma Surgeon

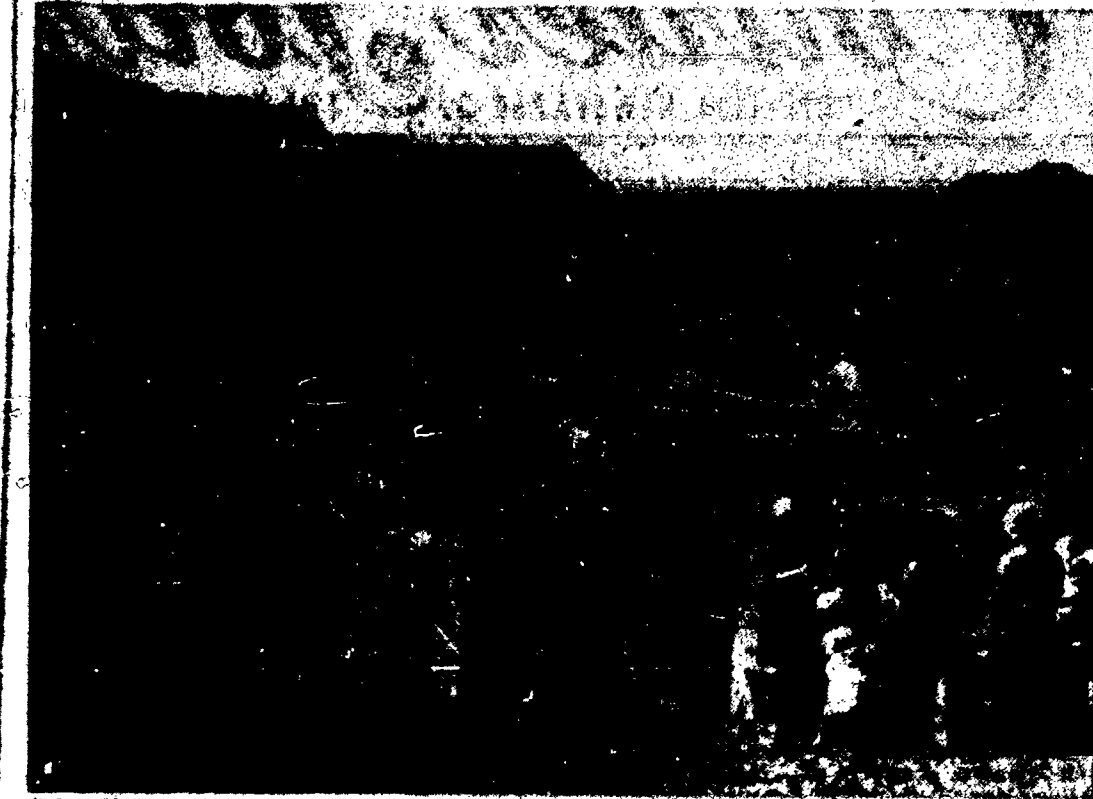
Gordon E. Seagrave, M.D., famed Burma surgeon, will be heard in the Aquinas Christian Culture Series, Sunday evening, Nov. 4, at Aquinas Institute auditorium, 127 Dewey Ave. at 8:15 p. m.

The Christian Culture Series is in its sixth season under the direction of the Rev. Hugh Hall, C.S.B., vice principal of Aquinas Institute.

Dr. Seagrave's career has taken him from Johns Hopkins Medical School in Baltimore to the Shan country of the North Burma jungle. For 25 years, unnumbered human beings suffering millions of miles, pestilence, and ignorance kept this distinguished medical missionary in that far east country.

The war found him medical officer of the Burma Road, attached to the late General Joseph Stilwell's army. His experiences have given him a background for lectures on the Burma Surgeon.

Born in Fomorzany, Galicia, on Sept. 24, 1881, Father Turula made his early studies in the Ukraine and was ordained in 1910 after studying in the University of Vienna and the University of Iwów.

First assignment was at Berwick, Pa. In 1911 he was transferred to St. Michael's Church, Woodstock, N.Y. From 1920 to 1923 he was pastor of Church of the Blessed Virgin Mary in Allentown, Pa. and in Dec. 1923 came to St. Josephat's.

Celebration of the jubilee was delayed a year due to unsettled conditions following the war, the committee stated.

Catholic Artists Indorse Labor Day Statement

Washington — (NC) — Hearty indorsement of the Labor Day statement of the Social Action Department, National Catholic Welfare Conference, has been voiced by the Catholic Artists Guild in a letter sent to the department following a meeting in New York. The group expressed particular approval of the recommendation that the government "in the very near future" call a "national meeting of the freely chosen representatives of organized labor, management, agriculture and the professions" to discuss possibility of the establishment of an occupational group system.

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
