Army chaplain and priest of the Archdiocese of Los Angeles, who is also a grand nephew of the late Archbishop Hyacinthe de Quelen of Paris, offered the Mass. The sermon was delivered by the Rev. Adolphe Rabel, of the Society of Mary, who as Military Vicar Delegate represented His Eminence Francis Cardinal Spellman, Archbishop of New York and Military Vicar of the U. S. Armed Forces.

A LOOK AT LABOR

The C. I. O. Convention will be nearing its end by the time that this column appears in print. No one apparently is able to predict what is going to occur in Atlantic City, and yet all friends of the C. I. O. know what should occur. Something should be done about the power of the Communists in the higher councils of that labor body in the national offices, the presence of Lee Pressman, attorney, and Lou De Caux, editor of the C. I. O. news, in addition to a number of Red hirings, has been responsible for tying Phil Murray in knots on many occasions. In the sphere of international unions, the Electrical Workers, the Longshoremen, the Transport Workers, the Maritime Workers, and many others, have given the national organization a bad name by their public declarations in favor of Soviet Russia, by their betrayal of American workers in the interest of Communist power, and by their violation of national C. I. O. policy.

The city and state industrial groups of the C. I. O. will be sponsoring an industrial conference of Communist leaders. And the Executive Council of the C. I. O. which determines the course of that body between conventions, has for many years made a proper proportion of Communist voting power. Consequently, if the question of Communism in the C. I. O. is to be settled at all, it must be settled on four fronts: by the national office, by the city and state industrial groups, and by the Executive Council.

Anti-Communists need a platform on the local level. Walter Reuther, Jimmy Green, Jim Carey, Phil Murray, among others are in favor of the C. I. O. as a labor union. They argue that the fight has already begun on the local level and that if Phil Murray ignores the issue, much labor in the C. I. O. will flow up in his face. They believe in the prevailing idea of decentralization that has already appeared in the automobile, electrical, and other unions. They feel that the C. I. O. and the National Labor Relations Board should be put in the position of having the C. I. O. and the NLRB control in equal parts.

Phil Murray is on the spot. He himself is certainly a tip-off.

Q. A mother writes that last week her son went to best camp and wishes her he cannot secure government insurance, sampling her as his beneficiary. She asks if this is correct?

A. Under the law it is for members of the armed forces to apply for National Service Life Insurance, they must be under 25 to active duty in 31 days or more. Therefore after his 31st day he cannot get a National Service Life Insurance.

Q. This reader states that as the father of a son and a son, he has been attending school on a full-time basis. Last week he asked the Veterans' Administration authorities about holding down a job after school hours, to augment his income, they said it was in order, as long as it was not a full time job. He is now told the rule has been changed and he must quit his job.

A. The law as amended limits the allowance and wages of a veteran to \$20 a month if he has dependents, or \$17 a month if he has no dependents. Under this new arrangement you may be employed on a full time basis, while attending school. But your income from your position and your allowance cannot be in excess of \$20 a month. Veterans' organizations, CVV included, are protesting this amendment and will move to have it repealed, as it is working many hardships on families who depended on the subsistence allowance, plus additional income, to maintain their homes while the vet father, or main support of a family, finished his education. We contend this change is akin to a violation of a contract, and should be nullified by the next session of congress, in the closing days, was not given credit, straight and consideration by members, rushing to get home for a vacation.

Q. This reader states he was given a medical discharge in 1945 after serving four months. He is 30 years of age, and asks, as he has less than six months service, will he be subject to being drafted again?

A. That would depend on whether or not you meet the present medical requirements. Discharged men between 10 and 20 who did not see active duty overseas and who had less than six months service at home are subject to re-induction, providing they meet present medical requirements.

Q. A vet who has recently married, states he never took out National Service Life Insurance while in the service, and inquires if he may take it out now despite the fact he has been discharged?

A. Yes, providing you served between Oct. 1949 and Sept. 2, 1945, and can meet the required physical standards or if a disqualifying disability is service connected. You should apply at the nearest office of the Veterans' Administration in your own neighborhood.

They were urged to address their protests to the Secretary General of the United Nations Assembly at Fishling, Long Island, N. Y.

U. S. Troops in Britain Give Memorial Altar

London — (NC) — Catholic officers and men of the U. S. 10th Reinforcement Depot have presented a new altar to the Catholic Garrison church at Litchfield, Staffordshire, near Birmingham, as a memorial to American troops killed in France and Germany.

The altar was unveiled and dedicated by Archbishop William Godfrey, Apostolic Delegate to Great Britain.
