### Bar Association In Tribute to Late E. J. Dwyer

A resolution paying tribute to the late Eugene J. Dwyer, for many years attorney for the Rochester Diocese, has been adopted by the Rochester Bar Association.

Bearing the signatures of five prominent bar members, the statement was accepted at a memorial meeting for Attorney Dwyer on Friday.

The late attorney is cited for his "notable contribution to the well-being of our City and State," and for serving his Church "faithfully and unselfishly."

Working with Mayor Hiram H. Edgerton in the conduct of the government of Rochester, their results were such as to deserve and receive the judgment of the New York Research Board that Rochester had the best major-city council government of its time.

Following Holy Mass, celebrated by the Most Rev. Richard J. Cushing, Archbishop of Rochester in the Carmelite Monastery, 1500 East Ave., Rochester, Wednesday, Nov. 27, Sister Ann of the Trinity received the black veil. The public ceremony followed her profession of solemn vows.

In the Sanctuary was His Excellency, Bishop Kearney. The Archbishop was assisted by the Rev. Dr. Wilfrid T. Craig and the Rev. John S. Farrell, chaplain of Carmel. Members of the Holy Eucharist of the Discolored Carmelite order attended the ceremony.

Sister Ann is the daughter of Dr. and Mrs. Joseph Stanton of Boston and is one of twelve children. Her eldest sister, St. Theresita, is in the Carmel of Boston. Another sister will receive the Habit there next Tuesday.

An older brother is a Jesuit. Sister Ann was graduated from the Sacred Heart Academy of Newton, Mass., and attended the Country Day School of the Sacred Heart and Regis College before entering Carmel.

### Charity Ladies Hear Foster Home Appeal By Father Ratigan

More than 250 Ladies of Charity, prospective members and friends attended a General Assembly at Our Lady of Lourdes Church and Hall, Elmira, on Sunday, Nov. 24.

Following recitation of the Prayer of a Lady of Charity to our Blessed Mother, the Rev. Arthur E. Ratigan, Diocesan Director of Family and Child Welfare addressed the Assembly.

Quoting from the Prayer, "I have become a member of the Ladies of Charity in order to sanctify my soul by serving to the best of my power the poor of Christ," he challenged his listeners to be faithful in this promise.

Referring to the work of the various Committees, he stressed the spiritual power as "there we have always with us. The program of the Society of Charity, which has been carried out, gives an opportunity for all the services that are needed by those who come to us."

Urges Forty Hours

He pleaded for Adoption and Foster Homes for Catholic children, mentioning that the problem belonged to the Ladies of Charity. He spoke of the children, needing this care, as orphans, because of parents who are incapacitated by illness or incompetence because of neglect and indifference.

"These children need security and the atmosphere of a Catholic home," he pointed out, "and they will be a source to your children with whom they must mingle in the schools and neighborhood. Certainly they will present problems but that does not cancel your obligation—it is one which is yours to meet."

Welcoming the Ladies at the Social Hour, which followed the conclusion of the Blessed Sacrament, Mrs. John F. McCormack, President, pointed out that the Society had given more than 25,000 hours of service during 1945 on Ladies of Charity projects and about 400 hours on other charitable and community programs.

Mrs. Daniel F. Kennedy, Secretary, presided.

Death of Archbishop Hickey occurred on Dec. 10, 1946 and was a stroke in which the Archbishop had been 70 years of age. He was a Bishop and 25 years an Archbishop.
