Cemetery Development
Plan Gets Underway

Operations have been started in the development of a new section of St. Peter and Paul's Cemetery in Elmira. It was announced today by William R. McCarthy, Superintendent.

This new section is in the northwestern part of the cemetery. It will be the first unit developed in a general plan designed by Raymond Wyrick, a nationally known cemetery engineer of Dubuque, Iowa.

The general plan calls for the eventual development of all the present unused section extending to Mt. Zoar Street. As this section develops, a beautiful new main entrance to the cemetery will be constructed on Mt. Zoar Street. Wide macadam roads will lead from there to that part now being utilized.

Predicts One of Finest

Mr. Wyrick, who has designed some of the most beautiful cemeteries in the United States, has included in his plans, extensive landscaping and shrubbery details. On his recent visit here, he was very enthusiastic about the abundance of natural scenery in the surrounding hills. He believed that when the general plan is fully carried out that the cemetery would be one of the finest in the State.

Henry Dalrymple of the Dalrymple Construction Company is personally directing the development of this first unit. If the weather continues mild, it is hoped that before winter sets in, the road circling this first unit will be completed. Grading and seeding will also be done now, and by late spring it is expected that burials will be permitted here.

Hornell—A tridium for all women and girls of St. Ann's parish in preparation for the Feast of the Immaculate Conception which closed Sunday afternoon, drew a large attendance.

Evening services held Wednesday, Thursday and Friday were conducted by the Rev. James V. Lowery, C.S.C. Father Lowery is assigned to the Eastern Mission Band of Holy Cross Fathers with headquarters in North, Easton, Mass.

Devotion of the Family Rosary was stressed during the Tridium as a powerful means of securing the three-fold intention for which the tridium was offered: the return of all men to Christ; a just and lasting peace; and harmony, understanding and cooperation between nations.

Following the solemn closing Sunday at which Father Lowery imparted the Papal Blessing, a meeting of women of the parish was held in the Federation Building and organization plans were begun to increase activity in the Rosary Society.

Movies based on the Nativity as well as short subjects were shown by Father Dissett to the large group present.
