ST. BONA GRID TEAM NOSED OUT IN BOWL GAME

Lexington, Ky.—A wide placement and a determined last-minute stand topped a hard-driving St. Bonaventure College football team when Muhlenberg College took the Olean eleven 26-25 at Still Field in the first Tobacco bowl game. Ed Sikorski scored three Muhlenberg touchdowns.

Fewer than 5,000 fans saw the Mules from Allentown, Pa., and Bonnies from Olean, N. Y., put on one of the most thrilling games played here this season.

St. Bonaventure's last thrust toward pay dirt was forced to an abrupt end when the Mules' Little All-America end, George Bilhous, intercepted a pass on his five-yard line and ran the ball back to the 10. The Bonnies had scored a few minutes before, when Ted Maziejewski's placement, which would have tied the score, was wide.

It was strictly offensive football from the start, with either team threatening each time it got the ball. Bonaventure gained 301 yards net rushing and the Mules 240. The Bonnies gained 113 yards on four pass completions in eleven attempts, while Muhlenberg completed six of seventeen for 134 yards.

Muhlenberg started the scoring to three and a half minutes. Harold Bell passed the last twenty-two yards to Sikorski, but the Bonnies drove right back to tie the count after Leo Haggerty, stealing the show from his Little All-America mate, Phil Coella, had raced forty-four yards to the Mule 4. Coella took the ball over the goal line.

Muhlenberg tallied again late in the first period, Bell passing to Sikorski after a 63-yard march had carried the ball to the Indian 12. The same combination clicked for the extra point. Sikorski punched over from the 3 early in the second period and the Mules had a commanding 18-0 advantage, but the Bonnies roared back on Haggerty's 74-yard run and Bob Kay's one-yard touchdown plunge. The half ended with Muhlenberg leading, 19-12.

The Tribe tied the count midway through the third period on a 44-yard pass from David Curtin to Frank Lovoulo, who ran another 15 yards. Maziejewski booted the point.

A 94-yard march paid off for Muhlenberg in the final period. Though Harry Macklin, his Mule mate, Carmine Sbordone, scooped the ball up on the 3 and waltzed over, Morris Quint kicked the point that provided the victory margin. Bonaventure's final score was on a 36-yard pass from Curtin to Lovoulo.
