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## Moral Duty of Catholic Nurse Stressed by NCCN

The Catholic nurse who loses sight of her moral obligation of serving the needs of suffering mankind will fall into the dangers of materialism, the National Council of Catholic Nurses (NCCN) warned in a statement this week at the Palmer House in Chicago.

Miss Mary Rose Mailey of Rochester, second vice president of the National organization participated in the deliberations.

Recognizing the need for and the justice of economic security for nurses, the Committee called attention to the purpose of their existence.

Words of the Holy Father were cited: "The Catholic nurse must be trained for the apostolate, that is to say, in the body which the nurse there is an immortal soul bought by the blood of the Son of God, of which she cannot lose sight."

"Never in the history of the Church has health care been so powerful and threatening in its battle with the supernatural. The Catholic nurse must be helped to carry on her professional activity in the light of the Church's doctrines and Christian morality."

The sacrifice of the many Catholic nurses who served the American people so well through two great wars should be recognized in a manner appropriate to such selfless service, the Council stated. A war memorial in the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception, Washington, D. C. it was announced, is being proposed for the active support of Catholic nurses.

Applications of three newly organized diocesan groups were approved for affiliation. These groups will make a total of 38 diocesan groups from 21 states affiliated with the National Council of Catholic Nurses.

Review of a controversial text book written for nurses will be distributed by the Council to the membership and to directors of Catholic Schools of Nursing.

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## ST. BONA GRID TEAM NOSED OUT IN BOWL GAME

Lexington, Ky.—A wide placement and a determined last-minute drive topped a hard-driving St. Bonaventure College football team when Muhlenberg College took the Olean eleven to the gridiron in the first Tobacco Bowl game. Ed Sikoraki scored three Muhlenberg touchdowns.

Fewer than 5,000 fans saw the Muhlenberg-Albany game, and Bonaventure from Olean, N. Y., put on one of the most thrilling games played here this season.

St. Bonaventure's last thrust toward pay dirt was forced to an abrupt end when the Muhlenberg defense, led by George Blumhagen, intercepted a pass on his five-yard line and ran the ball back to the 10. The Bonaventure had scored a few minutes before, when Ted Masejewski's placement which would have tied the score was wide.

It was a tricky offensive football from the start, with either team threatening each time it got the ball. Bonaventure gained 501 yards, not rushing and the Muhlenberg defense gained 113 yards. The four pass completions in eleven attempts, while Muhlenberg completed six of seventeen for 134 yards.
