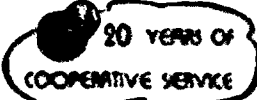


Meeting Set Jan. 2 By K. C. Auxiliary

The Elmira Heights group will apply to the Catholic War Veterans, Inc. for a charter. Named after two members of the parish who were killed in action, William E. Fesbich on Guam, and Andrew Macek on Leyte, the post has 40 members. St. Nicholas Church had 150 members in the armed forces.
