Ukrainian Veterans Organize CWV Post

Veterans of the St. Nicholas Ukrainian Catholic Church, Elmira Heights, met December 10, to organize a Catholic War Veterans Post. A special meeting was held Dec. 15, in the Church Auditorium, and the members selected the name Feshoh Macekur for their newly organized Post.

The Elmira Heights group will apply to the Catholic War Veterans, Inc. for a charter. Named after two members of the parish who were killed in action, William E. Feshoh on Guam, and Andrew Macekur on Leyte, the post has 40 members. St. Nicholas Church had 190 members in the armed forces.

At the organization meeting, Stephen J. Andrews was elected Commander; Paul S. Oubahn, tech. adjutant; Michael Beach, treasurer; Alexander N. Speer, William Simon and Peter Kuryla, trustees. The Rev. Stephen P. Szymanski, who is chaplain of the Ukrainian Catholic War Veterans of the Ball-Skerpon Post No. 773 of Sayre, Pa., is also chaplain of the Feshoh Macekur Post.

Following the selection of the name, the group offered a prayer for the four men killed in the war: Nicholas Ruzsak, North Africa; William E. Feshoh, Post.

Decoration of St. Ignatius Loyola Church Completed

Herald—Completion of the redecoration of St. Ignatius Loyola Church with the permission of His Excellency, Bishop Kearney is announced by the Rev. Ignatius X. Cameron, pastor. Work was handled by Gerace and Forde of Rochester.

Father Cameron and his parishioners expressed pleasure this week that the redecoration was completed in time for Midnight Mass and other services of Christmas Day. No special effort was held to defray expenses of this special work, the money having been set aside from the parish building fund and other regular sources.

The work, begun in November, was the first redecoration accomplished in the church since it was erected in September, 1835. St. Ignatius parish was founded by the late Bishop John Francis O'Hern, in July, 1831, and Father Cameron appointed pastor. During depression years services were held in a Canisteo street department store. The present church was dedicated September 17, 1835, by His Eminence Edward Cardinal Mooney of Detroit, then Bishop of the Rochester diocese.

The redecoration included washing and varnishing of all oak woodwork, ceiling trusses, altar and communion rail and all polychroming renewed. Walls of the nave, vestries and vestibules were decorated in tones of light buff with varied shades in the block pattern. Side altar recesses have been decorated with carvings, finished with gold glaze and statues were retouched.

The entire Sanctuary was decorated and finished in gold blending with the colors of the nave. The Stations of the Cross were retouched in bronze. The baldachin, dorsal drapery and central crucifix were cleaned and retouched.

All the appointments of the church were thoroughly refinished and lighting fixtures in the nave and sanctuary cleaned. Local painters were employed in the work.

Some Intolerance Needed Says Senator

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Family Sunday For Communion Set January 12

Inaugurated by His Excellency, Bishop Kearney, in 1940, the annual Family Communion throughout the Diocese of Rochester will take place on Sunday, Jan. 12, Feast of the Holy Family.

The practice of father, mother and the children receiving Holy Communion in a body and then taking mother to breakfast in downtown restaurants resulted in a great outpouring to the churches each year since it was first started.

Children's Masses for the day are dispensed with so the children may go with their parents to the altar rail. Sermons on the family and the ideal of the Holy Family have added to the solemnity and impressiveness of the observance.

His Excellency, the Bishop will issue a letter to be read in the churches Sunday, Jan. 5, inviting the families to partake again in the practice of going to Mass and Communion together.

176 Adult Negroes Baptized in N. Y.

New York — (NC) — A total of 176 adult Negroes were baptized at ceremonies in two churches here.

Bishop Stephen J. Donahue, Auxiliary of New York presided at the ceremony in St. Charles Borromeo Church, at which 102 were baptized. The Bishop was attended by three Monsignori and 25 priests from the archdiocese were in the Sanctuary.

Seventeen priests administered the Sacrament, each baptizing six or seven persons. In an earlier ceremony 74 adults were baptized in St. Aloysius Church.

Mass Kit Presented to New Cruiser 'Rochester' by Diocese Namesake

Charlestown, Mass. — Presentation of a Mass kit from the people of the Rochester, N. Y. Diocese to the U. S. S. Rochester featured the commissioning of the heavy cruiser at colorful ceremonies here last Friday.

The presentation of the kit was made to Captain Harry A. Guthrie, U.S.N. by the Rev. Dr. Charles J. Mahoney, Diocesan Superintendent of Schools.

During the ceremonies attended by a group of leading citizens from Rochester, the ship's flag, purchased by the parochial and public school children of the same city, flew from the mast of the first capital ship commissioned by the Navy since the cessation of hostilities.

Rear Admiral Wilbur H. Baker, commander of the U. S. Naval Base at Boston, formally placed the ship in commission and delivered a brief address, praising the industrial leaders and workers of Rochester for the production of two billion dollars worth of equipment for the armed forces.

Mrs. St. Herbert Eisenhower, sponsor of the new cruiser, presided over those who had constructed the U. S. S. Rochester. Keel for the ship was laid on May 29, 1944, and it was launched on August 26, 1945.

Vice Mayor Frank E. Van Lare spoke in behalf of the City of Rochester.

Three Rochester sailors, one a veteran of World War II, were aboard the newly commissioned heavy cruiser which left on a shakedown cruise to Panama following the ceremony.

The trio included Albert Cappizzo, 23, of 1723 Norton St., Art Rudis, 18, 77 Devonshire Dr., and Roland Butler, 17, 641 Ridgewood West.

Named in honor of the city's "outstanding World War II production effort," the Rochester is the first Navy vessel to bear the city's name since the old cruiser Rochester was decommissioned in 1923.

At the commissioning ceremony, Mrs. Eisenhower, who christened the 12,700-ton cruiser when it was launched, said:

"I wish all the people of Rochester could be here to share the honor and joy of this great day. May the Rochester be a guardian of peace. May she sail with good steady wind and will, through powerful waters wherever she may go."

As her words echoed over the ship's public address system, the national ensign, purchased with the proceeds of Rochester parochial and public school children's pledges, snapped smartly in the breeze from high up on the mast of the new ship.

Following the ceremonies, Capt. Guthrie, former officer aboard the original Rochester, addressed the Rochester delegation.
