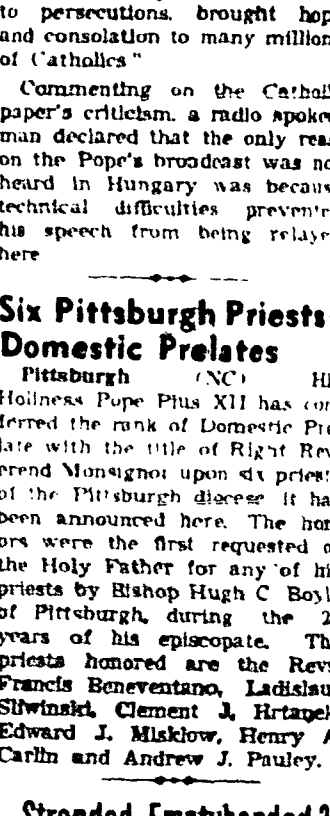
Six Pittsburgh Priests Domestic Prelates
