Pulpit Supplemented by Growing Number of Parish Publications

Parish publications, many with circulations of over 1000, are serving Rochester diocesan Catholics as supplements to the pulpit and as a means of keeping the laity informed on the latest news.

Such newspapers, bulletins and announcements, a large number of which are published regularly each week, have become a common service throughout the diocese in the last few years.

Among the most recent additions to the list of parish publications is "The Parish Weekly," published each week by the Holy Cross Church of the Holy Spirit, 1000 E. Main St. This publication, which circulates 1500 copies, is a four-page newspaper with the same general characteristics as the other two parish papers. Started in 1944, its weekly circulation is now over 1500. The Rev. Fr. John J. McLaughlin, pastor, is its editor.

Another largely circulated bulletin is the "Announcements" of St. John's Church, where the Rev. Fr. William F. Bergin, diocesan chancellor, is pastor. An average of 2,000 copies of this printed folder have been distributed each week since the first issue in April, 1945.

St. Mary's Church of Auburn, pastored by the Rev. Fr. William J. Cullen, is among the earliest distributed parish bulletins. Also one of the oldest publications, the "Parish Bulletin" was begun in 1935. It circulates about 1500 copies regularly.

Some 1,300 copies of the St. Andrew's "Parish Digest" have been given out each week to members of the parish for the past two years of the paper's existence. The "Digest" is a compact mimeographed sheet.

Among other city parishes with regular publications are Holy Apostles, with an average circulation of 800; "St. Anne's Shrine Bulletin," also 800; St. Bridget's "Briefcase," 700; St. Patrick's "Shamrock" and "St. Theodore's Chronicle."

One notable new addition to the list of town diocesan publications is "The Parish," St. Patrick's Church, Macedon, "Wayne County's Only Sunday Paper." This weekly, mimeographed sheet is the work of the Rev. Fr. Bernard C. Hanna, pastor.

Other out of town bulletins are: St. Alphonsus, Auburn, "Bulletin," circulating 900 copies; Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary, Brockport, "Stellights," 800; St. Anthony, Elmira, "Antonian," 600; St. Peter and Paul, Elmira, 600; Immaculate Conception, Ithaca, "Holy Name Bulletin," 700; St. Patrick, Melrose, "The Catholic," 500; St. Mary's of the Lake, Watkins Glen, "Bulletin," 350.

Another outstanding job of newspaper publishing is being done by "The Catholic Advocate," Holy Name Society monthly of St. Joseph's Ukrainian Church, Rochester.

Edited by Charles Bastlik, the mimeographed "Advocate" carries every type of parish social item including marriages, deaths, and births, in addition to news of the parish school, societies, veterans and the like. Sections are also devoted to sports, personal items and editorials.

During recent months, many interesting articles explaining the Ukrainian rites and church customs have been featured. The "Advocate" has its own photographer and is freely illustrated.

GEORGETOWN 2488 TOPS HOLY NAME BOWLING LEAGUE

Old St. Mary's
With total receipts for the year 1946, \$117,145.20 which included \$28,331.35 in Sunday collections, the financial statement of Old St. Mary's Church, Washington Park, was released this week.

The statement was prepared under the direction of the Rev. Dr. George P. Kettell, pastor of Old St. Mary's Church as treasurer, Les C. Fleming and Simon A. Malone are lay trustees and Thomas F. Troit and Arthur J. Boehm are auditors.

Outstanding items under receipts in Old St. Mary's statement are: Propagation of the Faith, \$1,883.43; Easter collection, \$1,844.35; and Holy Day collection, \$2,481.70. Voluntary contributions, \$6,240.89; Seminary collection, \$1,550; St. Andrew's Jubilee, \$3,017.37; and Pastoralist Missions, \$1,068.80.

The church has \$25,000 in Government Bonds; \$15,270.64 in Rehabilitation Fund (Interest), \$17,517.97 in Securities (Market Value) and a cash checking account of \$10,697.97 with total reserves, \$68,835.55.

Holy Rosary Church
A total income of \$44,000.64 was reported by the Holy Rosary Church, Lexington Ave., making public its financial statement this week.

Of this figure a sum of \$44,000.64 represents amounts taken in on Sunday offerings and Holy Days in Holy Rosary. The parish also raised \$1,585.53 in its Fall Festival.

Large amounts of money were given on the various missions, a total income of \$1,585.53 for the Fall Festival.
