

### 7 Scholarships For Nazareth College Offered

Seven honor scholarships will be awarded, this year, to successful candidates competing in examinations to be held at the College on East Ave., Rochester, on Saturday, Feb. 13.

In addition to the general test given to all competitors, an aptitude and a performance test will be required for the scholarship in Music, and a sample of the student's work must be submitted for the scholarship in Art. The general test will begin at 9:00 A. M. and the music test will be given in the afternoon. Art specimens must be presented on the day of the examination.

To qualify for the examination a candidate will submit her high school record and present the recommendation of the principal of her school; she must also meet the entrance requirements of Nazareth College and rank in the upper fifth of her class.

The scholarships offered are as follows:

- Two Complete Tuition Scholarships, \$1500 (1934-5) a year.
  - Three Partial Tuition Scholarships, \$500 (1934-5) a year.
  - Two Partial Tuition Scholarships, \$100 (1934-5) a year.
  - One of the \$500 scholarships will be awarded to a major in Music and one to a major in Art.
- Formal application must be made to the Registrar of Nazareth College, Rochester 10 New York, before Feb. 5.

Father Heindl served in the Southwest Pacific for more than three years as chaplain of the 149th Infantry Regiment.

### 'Unique Night Club' Open to Diocesan Men

"Nocturnal"—the abbreviated term for the Nocturnal Adoration Society used by its fervent night club" build-up, organization stated this week.

With its purpose to provide adorers for the Eucharistic Lord during the lonely hours of the night, the Nocturnal Adoration Society was formed in Rochester in Sept., 1923, with the approval of His Excellency, the late Most Rev. John F. O'Hern.

At that time the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Charles F. Shay, rector of St. Patrick's Cathedral said "all Catholic men are invited to join the Nocturnal Adoration Society." The invitation still holds good, the present moderator, the Rev. Leo C. Mooney, states.

Assembling on the last Saturday night of each month, the Society in Rochester spends the adoration hours in St. Patrick's Church on Plymouth Ave., North at Brown St. One group begins at 10 p. m. and each hour there is another group of men reporting for an hour's devotion before the Blessed Sacrament exposed.

Meet Together

There are three occasions on which the men get together to know each other and one of these will be the annual Communion Mass and breakfast on Passion Sunday. His Excellency, Bishop

Kearney will celebrate the Mass and address the men at the breakfast. The Bishop also participates in the Holy Hour on Holy Thursday which the adorers attend and the Holy Hour on the Feast of Christ the King in one of the Rochester churches.

Termed the "spiritual power house of Catholic action" for the diocese by Bishop Kearney, the Nocturnal Adoration Society in Rochester Diocese has been outstanding in the United States.

When organized in Rochester in 1929 the organization was brought to other points in the diocese and was organized in March, 1932, in Auburn, Geneva and Seneca Falls, and in Elmira and Hornell in 1933 with Corning and Watertown following. The latest unit is in St. Morris at St. Patrick's Church.

Father Mooney, Fred J. Mix, Charles A. Tucker, the late William G. Wynn and Cyril J. Siant, made the trips to the key cities in the diocese to organize this "night club" of devotion and adoration.

Servicemen Welcomed

With the return of the servicemen renewed interest has been stimulated in this "night club" in which President Frank E. Wolfe of the Rochester society says "there are no reservations needed, no waiting in line, no jockeying for a ring-side table, no cover charge."

The procedure of joining is simple. Secretary Joseph W. Benn is present at 9:30 p. m., each time the Society maintains its vigil to greet Catholic men and to enroll them in the society.

The Nocturnal Adoration Society in Rome received the blessing and approval of Pope Pius VII in 1814. It was canonically erected on Dec. 23, 1813, and then raised to the dignity of an Arch-confraternity on April 27, 1824, by Pope Leo XII.

During the revolution of 1810, the devotion spread to Paris, then to England where it was organized on Aug. 6, 1863, in Kensington Chapel, London. In Spain the practice was started in 1877, in Montreal, Canada, in 1882, and was introduced in the United States at Boston by seven men in 1882. The Baltimore Society began in 1924, and the New York City unit in 1891.

The ready response and faithful attendance of members of the Society in Rochester diocese has been a source of edification to other men in the various parishes and of gratitude to Bishop and pastors, the society's officers state.

### Cut in Veteran Subsistence Hit By CWV Post 942

A resolution condemning the "breach of faith" by the 73rd Congress which resulted in a cut in veterans subsistence allowance was unanimously adopted by Holy Cross Post No. 812, Catholic War Veterans at a meeting Monday, Jan. 22.

Next meeting of the Post is scheduled Wednesday, Feb. 7 at 8 p. m. in Holy Rosary Hall.

Introduced by Fred D. Postorius, Welfare Officer, the statement was first voted on and then forwarded to the County Chapter, Catholic War Veterans.

Letters from representatives of the New York State legislature supporting the CWV stand against Eubank's were read by Commander Dulree.

Ernest J. Schnepf, Rochester attorney and former P. L. E. agent, was guest speaker, addressing a large turnout of veterans.

Mr. Schnepf warned the group not to take Communism lightly and quoted J. Edgar Hoover's statements at the American Legion Convention in San Francisco.

"Every communist is a potential Russian agent," the attorney declared, urging the veterans to be as zealous in spreading the truth as communists are in spreading their destructive activities.

### Father Gillis Lecture Set Sunday in Aquinas Series

"American Policy—Here and Aboard" will be discussed by the Rev. James M. Gillis, C.S.P., editor of the Catholic World in a Christian Culture Lecture to be delivered Sunday evening, Feb. 2, at Aquinas Institute Auditorium.

Father Gillis' lecture will begin at 8 p. m. and the Rev. Hugh Haffey, C.S.B., director of the Christian Culture Lecture Series, will act as chairman. The lecture will be followed by an open forum discussion in which members of the audience will be given the opportunity of asking questions of the speaker.

Author of "What's Right With the World," syndicated columnist of the Courier-Journal and other Catholic newspapers, Father Gillis is one of America's best known Catholic writers and speakers.

This year he is marking his 25th year as editor of the Catholic World, monthly publication of the Paulist Congregation to which he belongs.

Father Gillis is equally well known to the radio listening public having made frequent appearances on the National Broadcasting Company's Catholic Hour.

He is author of "False Prophets," "The Catholic Church and the Home," "Ten Commandments," "Christianity and Civilization," "The Paulists," and "This Our Day."

The noted Paulist priest was in Rochester last September as speaker at the Knights of Columbus Golden Jubilee Mass and banquet.

### Communism's Threat To U. S. Told Legion By Former Chaplain

Fortified with moral courage and good sense, a speaker determined to alert U. S. citizens to the danger of Communism in the near future, members of the Holy Cross Post, American Legion, were urged by the Rev. Dr. George E. Kettel, at installation ceremonies Sunday.

Dr. Kettel, pastor of St. Mary's Church, Rochester, and former national American Legion chaplain, was principal speaker at the installation of officers by the 45 and 28th Teams of Monroe Veterans No. 111, American Legion, in Columbus Civic Center.

"Russia does not want peace," Dr. Kettel said. "The communist member of the House of Representatives, the Hon. Caryl Chessman, from South Dakota, chairman of the sub-committee on the American activities led by the Russia does not want peace with the 13 governments of the states which now come under her orbit, have been so regulated as to fall easily under her control."

In the country Russia plans to use her power to spread her influence, the former chaplain said. Economic authorities in the nation's capital, Dr. Kettel said, know that Russia is planning a depression to occur in the U. S. in 1935 which would be devastating.

The Soviet, he held, will point to conditions here and declare our government has failed, that she has succeeded upon this country and will wipe it out. It is a decided hope that steps are not taken now to circumvent these plans. Sound industrial relations and adequate compensation must be combined with the individual battle against Communism.

Communism, he pointed out, is the negation of those rights that we take for granted. The Communist holds that there is no God, no rights such as freedom of speech or assembly, no right to property, no freedom of the press nor religious freedom. He urged the Legionnaires to
