Find Use for 'Opium'

Vatican City — (NC) — It seems that Catholics, too, can find a use for the "opium of religion." This is the comment of Osservatore Romano, Vatican City daily, after quoting a report from the London Review which stated that the recent visit to Jerusalem by the Metropolitan Gregory of Leningrad is part of a Russian plan to unify all the separated Churches under the authority of Moscow. The report quoted by Osservatore said that the presence of the Russian consul general at the installation of the Patriarch Maximus of Constantinople shows the Soviet desire to become the protector of the Orthodox Churches through out the world, and that the Jerusalem visit indicated a Soviet plan to unite the Orthodox Churches in its campaign against the Vatican and to prepare the way for a world council of Orthodoxy to be held in Moscow in the near future.

Conservatore points to a lack of coherence in the religious policy of the Soviets, who, it explains, follow the principle that the end justifies the means, and adds: "Evidently Catholics can find a use for 'the opium of religion,' and are now sending out representatives to 'study' the people and to facilitate the diffusion of this 'opium' in order to strike him who does not use truth as a political instrument and who does not admit that religion and the Church should be at the beck and call of any Caesar, whether his name be Czar or People's Commissar."

Those 'Fellow Travelers'

Washington — (NC) — A great many Americans may be expected to take a somewhat different view of communist activities in the United States, as a result of the spectacular development already flowing from the inquiry of the House of Representatives Committee on Un-American Affairs, and because of the sensational disclosures, freely predicted for the future.

This change of attitude may well be an awakening to the seriousness of the situation with which the communist ideology is fostered and propagated in this country. It might mean the abandonment of that viewpoint which regards communism in the United States as at times annoying but hardly dangerous.

Such an attitude need not have anything to do with "red-baiting," as many will hasten to charge. It need not be a case of seeing shadows where there are none. It will be an impressive thing if it is simply an awareness of the blessings of the American way of life, and an alertness to attacks upon it.

When sensation had tumbled after sensation for some five hours at an open hearing of the House committee, culminating in that group asking the Department of Justice to prosecute Gerhard Eisler, alleged top communist in this country, on a charge of conspiracy to overthrow the United States Government, one member of the committee was quoted as saying in effect that this was only the beginning. If it is, what is to follow is likely to prove mighty embarrassing to some so-called fellow-travelers in this country.
