St. Ann's Church Leaders Open Campaign



Prepared for the campaign to raise \$30,000 for needed improvements by St. Ann's Church, Hornell are these leaders in the drive.

\$30,000 Improvement Campaign Opens Sunday in Hornell Parish

Hornell—With a goal set at \$30,000, parishioners of St. Ann's Church here will launch a campaign to cover installation of church property heating systems and other church improvements on Sunday, Feb. 23.

The campaign, which will officially close with a victory banquette March 6, has been given episcopal approval by the Most Rev. James E. Kearney, Bishop of the Rochester Diocese, who said in a letter to Father Dunn:

"May I send a word of encouragement to you and a word of appeal to your good parishioners to give their generous support to your campaign. I am sure your people will rally to your support with magnificent results."

Campaign slogan is "St. Ann's Has never Failed You! Will You Fail St. Ann's?" The Rev. Paul J. Gibbons is general chairman of the drive.

Pastor States Need

Calling upon the parishioners for generous response in the campaign, the Rev. Andrew T. Dusett, pastor states:

"The removal of the present sources of heat supply from St. Ann's Church and other parish buildings in the not too distant future places a very real and urgent problem before us at this time. Plans must be made and funds secured to provide five heating plants for the parish buildings. In addition, we would like to obtain a fund to provide for the exterior resurfacing of St. Ann's Church, if and when that becomes popular."

Father Dusett at the opening dinner in Hotel Sherwood addressed an assembly of workers and said that he hoped that the church building modernization may be completed for the Centenary celebration of St. Ann's Church in 1949.

ST. MARY'S MEN ELECT EMLAW

Auburn — Joseph Emlaw was chosen president of the Holy Name Society of St. Mary's Church at elections and business transactions held in Lyceum Hall. Retiring President Charles Cora presided.

Food rations in Holland during World War II often consisted of two ounces of butter plus a third of a loaf of bread per meal per person, Mr. Van Rhyn said.

The prevalence of the Black market was exemplified by the following prices quoted by the speaker. For instance, a suit of clothes sold for between \$900 and \$1,500. A loaf of bread, when available, cost \$3. Flour sold for \$6,000 a bushel.

The speaker gave an interesting account of his work in the intelligence division of the Dutch Underground. This work consisted of searching for German troops, keeping of Dutch materials from the Germans, confiscating of Dutch radios when about to fall into the hands of the invaders.

Mr. Van Rhyn poignantly described the persecution of the Jews in Holland. Hundreds of Jews, eighty-five percent of the Jewish population in Holland were killed during World War II, he said.

Tells of "Hunger Walks"

Perhaps the most striking facts disclosed by Mr. Van Rhyn were those concerning the "hunger walks." It was impossible to find food with money. Therefore, he was necessary to go barter as a means of trade. Farms where food could be bought, were often 125 miles from a city and it was necessary to cover this distance by foot or by bicycle, he stated.

The speaker also made an interesting comparison between school life in Holland and that in the United States. As an illustration he stated that it is necessary to study and attain a satisfactory average in French, English, German, Latin and Greek in addition to the native Dutch language. He explained that no choice of subjects is permitted.

In conclusion, Mr. Van Rhyn stated that due to wartime conditions religious fervor had increased in Holland. Material wealth, the Hollander believed, has come to mean little or nothing to the average Dutchman. The ever present shadow of death, he said, has made the Hollander ever ready to meet his Maker.
