Rev. Maloney was wounded at Bastogne during the historic "Battle of the Bulge" and received the Purple Heart.

Bombed Cathedrals Being Rebuilt

Salzburg — (NC) — Continuous progress is being made in the reconstruction of Salzburg Cathedral, damaged by aerial bombardment in October, 1944.

Latest estimate is that the famous edifice will be rebuilt by 1951 or 1952.

So far more than 100,000 cubic feet of debris have been cleared away; a 90-foot wall and a provisional roof has been constructed while scaffolding 140 feet high has been built over the damaged cupola as part of the task of reforming the vaults of the transept and the cupola.

In Vienna, work is going ahead on the rebuilding of St. Stephen's Cathedral, where 220,000 cubic feet of debris was removed after a bombing raid in 1945.

Work has been built over the ruins and temporary and then being replaced by the roof, which will be decorated in the same fantastic colors as it had been before the bombing.

The task of rebuilding will not be finished before 1955.

Deny School Room To Religion Class

Pasadena, N. J. — (RNS) — The Pasadena Board of Education has refused the request of a local parish for use of a school room for religious instruction.

Father Joseph Mazzanotte, of St. Anthony's church had asked Board members for use of a single room, one hour a week after school hours, so he could more conveniently gather children studying the catechism in preparation for first holy communion and confirmation.

He explained the necessity had arisen as an outgrowth of last year's loss of School No. 7 through fire, saying transfer of all students to School No. 11 brought on overcrowding and late hours. The irregular classes, holding some students until 4:30 p. m. made it extremely difficult, he said, to have successful catechism classes in the church several blocks away.

The priest asked that a room be made available in School No. 11 so the children could remain in the same building, saving time, energy and risk.

Timothy J. McCarthy, president of the Board of Education said state regulations forbid the use of school property for sectarian religious purposes.

He announced that the school principal would be authorized to excuse students an hour earlier so they could attend their confirmation class in the church.

Keenan Brothers Take Over 'Mail-Me-Monday' System

Catholic War Veterans Meet

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WOULD OUST RED U. S. EMPLOYEES

Washington, D. C. — Removal of government employees "who take their orders from Moscow" was urged by the Very Rev. Ignatius Smith, O.P., dean of the School of Philosophy of The Catholic University of America, in addressing the silver anniversary luncheon of the Cosmopolitan Club of Washington here.

Assessing that 1,500,000 Americans are pledged to destruction of the Nation's democracy, Father Smith charged that "communism does not operate for the protection of property or the benefit of the working man" and that "the freedoms Americans think to be essential" invariably have been destroyed in lands dominated by Russia.

His address was an appeal to the club's membership to assume "the individual and collective responsibility for stamping out the causes of communism" in this community. He named specifically racial discrimination, destructive labor and management practices, unemployment and inadequate housing as problems to be remedied.

"The United States is presently engaged in a war against the communistic materialistic philosophy," Father Smith said, "in warning that 'the development of counterfeit liberalistic movements has grown in the last five years.' 'Communism,' he added, 'cannot grow in happiness. Unhoused masses, unemployment, hatred, dissension hamper our well being.'"
