Spirit of the hallowed Last Supper room, birthplace of two sacraments, is the spirit of the Religious of Our Lady of Cenacle, who are seeking a home in Rochester.

The Sisters, whose special mission is the organization and conduct of spiritual retreats for women, have accepted the invitation of Msgr. Hickey, Bishop Kearney, to establish themselves in Rochester when a suitable home can be found.

Otherwise known as the Society of Our Lady of the Rosary, the Cenacle, the order derives its title from the first Cenacle, the cradle of the Church.

Cenacle comes from the Latin word "Cibaculum," meaning upper chamber, which refers to the room where Christ instituted the sacraments of Holy Eucharist and Holy Orders and where He appeared on the evening of the resurrection.

Scenes of First Retreat

It was thus that the First Retreat was made after the Ascension, according to the Acts of the Apostles, by the Blessed Mother of God, the Apostles and the holy women. Thus, Mary in the Cenacle awaiting the coming of the Holy Spirit became the inspiration and model of the Religious of the Cenacle.

The Society was born in 1820 at La Louviere, France, near the tomb of St. John Francis Regis, the Jesuit apostle of the poor. The parents were Jean-Pierre-Etienne Terme, a bold and zealous missionary priest of the Diocese of Lavaur.

The letter follows:
