

Budenz Sees Reds Setting Protestants vs. Catholics

Chicago — (RNS) — Louis F. Budenz, Fordham University professor and former Communist managing editor of The Daily Worker, said here that Communists are attempting to wreck Catholic prestige in America by setting Protestants against Catholics.

He cited the Protestant Magazine (of which Kenneth Landon is the editor) as being the principal medium through which the American Communist Party seeks to smear the Catholic hierarchy of the United States.

"But," said Budenz, "American Protestants are not being taken in by Communist propaganda. Our good Protestant friends know Communism for what it is and are not influenced by The Protestant Magazine which is incorrectly named since it does not in anyway represent an accurate cross-section of American Protestant thought."

He said that while every effort must be made to uproot the American Communist Party which he described as "a Quilting organization similar to the German Bund," American Catholics will find that the papal encyclicals and a fight for racial equality and social and economic justice are their best weapons against Communism.

Washington — (RNS) — Mrs. Math Lisa of Ashland, Mass., at the Diocese of Wichita, has been chosen the Catholic Mother of 1947. It was announced here by Miss Mary Callahan of Cleveland, president of the National Catholic Conference on Family Life, which annually makes the award.

Usually announced on May 4, the award of St. Joseph, patroness of Catholic mothers, the 1947 award was made known earlier to enable Mrs. Lisa to be present at the 13th annual National Catholic Conference on Family Life convention to be held in Chicago, March 10 to 12, where she will receive the Medal from the Shrine of Christian Motherhood from His Eminence Cardinal Stritch, Archbishop of Chicago.

Mrs. Lisa is a widow and the mother of 14 living children. She lives on the farm east of Ashland, Kan., on the farm she and her late husband established some 40 years ago. Born on March 18, 1885, she is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Peter Betzen who lived on a farm near St. Marks, Kan.

Mrs. Lisa was married at 28 and brought up 14 children before her husband died in an automobile accident in 1921. Mrs. Lisa has a son, the Rev. Michael J. Lisa, stationed in Wichita; and a daughter, a nun, Sister M. Jesuits Defended By Protestant

Basel, Switzerland — (RNS) — Protestants have no reason to be pained by some agitation against the Jesuits, Prof. Fritz Blanke, distinguished member of the Protestant theological department at the University of Zurich and outstanding church historian, declared here.

Referring to recent polemics in connection with the Rev. Dr. Swiss radio has applied against Jesuit speakers, Professor Blanke contended that article 51 of the Swiss Constitution is unconstitutional in the first place, as incorporated by such nationalism as the great Swiss historian Jakob Burckhardt, the poet and writer, Jeremias Gotthelf, and many others. At any rate, Professor Blanke said, the Constitution excludes Jesuits from church and school only, at the present time. All other activities are permissible for them.

Investigating the historical background of the anti-Jesuit provisions of the Swiss Constitution, Professor Blanke insisted that it originated wide political radicals.
