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
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22 Catholic Students' Art Work Exhibited at Sibley's

Twenty-five students from three Catholic educational institutions in Rochester, including five gold key winners, are represented in the Fifth Annual Central Western New York Schools Art Exhibition, which opened in the third floor art gallery at Sibley, Lindsay & Curr Company's sponsor with Scho-

lastic Magazine, on March 1, 1947 according to Miss Marjorie A. Lush, General Chairman.

This exhibition will continue through Saturday, March 15.

Eleven more schools are represented this year—a total of 46, as compared with 35 in 1946. Sixteen schools are represented for the first time this year.

Work of winners in this exhibition will be forwarded to Pittsburgh to compete in the National Art Exhibition, April 15, where cash awards and scholarships will be given.

There are 1860 entries this year as compared with 1233 in 1946—329 more entries in 1947. The counties represented include Allegany, Livingston, Monroe, Ontario, Orleans, Seneca, Steuben, Wayne, and Yates.
