CVV'S COUNTY UNIT SPURNS ANTI-BIAS BILL

Condemnation of the Austin-Mononey, so-called "Anti-Bias" bill was contained in a resolution passed by Monroe County Chapter, Catholic War Veterans, last meeting at Holy Redeemer Auditorium, 338 Clifford Ave., last week.

The resolution signed by Bernard H. Florack, county historian of the CVV, will be sent to all New York State Senators and Assemblymen.

Stressed in the resolution was the following:

"The fundamental objective of the bill becomes vicious, because discrimination on account of race, creed or color is made in the bill a 'corrupting' and 'anti-educational practice' and a betrayal of the purpose for which public aid or subsidy is granted.

"Under such a bill, every parochial school which limits its students to Catholics would be considered an offender against true education. Anti-discrimination would become an essential part of education. If this principle is upheld, no private sectarian institution would be eligible for any public support whatsoever.

"This bill considers as a exemption which our institutions presently enjoy as a subsidy by the State. Our institutions would be considered in the light of this bill to be unworthy of any support and anti-democratic."

HITLER FOE TO LECTURE AT AQUINAS

Dr. Kurt von Schuschnigg, an outstanding Catholic layman of Austria who recently arrived in this country, will conclude another season of Aquinas Christian Culture lectures Sunday evening, March 17 at 8 p. m. in Aquinas Auditorium.

Dr. Schuschnigg, who spent several years in military confinement under the Nazi regime, will discuss "My Story," according to the Rev. Hugh Henry, C. S. R., director and founder of the Christian Culture Series.

The date has been held open throughout the current lecture season.

Dr. Schuschnigg arrived in New York on Thursday, Feb. 6, on the Belgium steamship Heuland. He was accompanied by his wife, the former Countess Vera Fugger-Czerin von Mohauzen, who voluntarily joined him in the Nazi prison camp in 1942.

Dr. Schuschnigg believes that it is possible for Germany to become a democratic country, seeing that there were many outstanding advocates of democracy before the advent of Hitler.

Replying to questions at conferences in New York regarding his capitulation to Hitler at Berchtesgarden in February, 1938, the former Austrian Chancellor stated that he had no other alternative.

When he was called to Berchtesgarden presumably for a casual talk concerning matters of little importance, Dr. Schuschnigg averred, Hitler informed him that he was prepared to invade Austria by land and air.

"Hitler said he would respect our independence," he stated, "I hoped he would keep his word. I had no choice."

He praises the present coalition government of Austria as the best his country could have in the transition period from war to peace, adding that "Gen. Mark Clark, who commanded the American occupation forces, is the most popular man in Austria."
