Geneva — John Harding, son of Mr. and Mrs. John S. Harding, former Genevans now of Cayo, has been promoted from assistant to principal keeper at Auburn prison, according to an official announcement.

Mr. Harding will replace Lloyd E. Whipple who has been promoted to superintendent of Woodburne State Institution for Mental Defectives.

Mr. Harding was educated in Geneva and lived here most of his life until moving to Auburn. His wife is the former Miss Gertrude Grimes of this city. They have two children, John and Suzanne.

The new keeper is a graduate of Geneva High School and attended St. Stephen's College, Annandale-on-the-Hudson. His parents, who resided in Geneva for many years, are now living with their son, Rev. Francis Harding, in Cayo.

Mr. Harding, a veteran of 17 years in state correctional service, has been a member of the Auburn prison staff since he began as a guard July 3, 1923. He was promoted April 13, 1934, to Sergeant and Feb. 1, 1938, to Captain in guard forces.

He was made assistant keeper Aug. 1, 1941.

Mr. Harding has an uncle and aunt, Mr. and Mrs. George Devine, and two uncles, Thomas and William Harding, residing in Geneva.

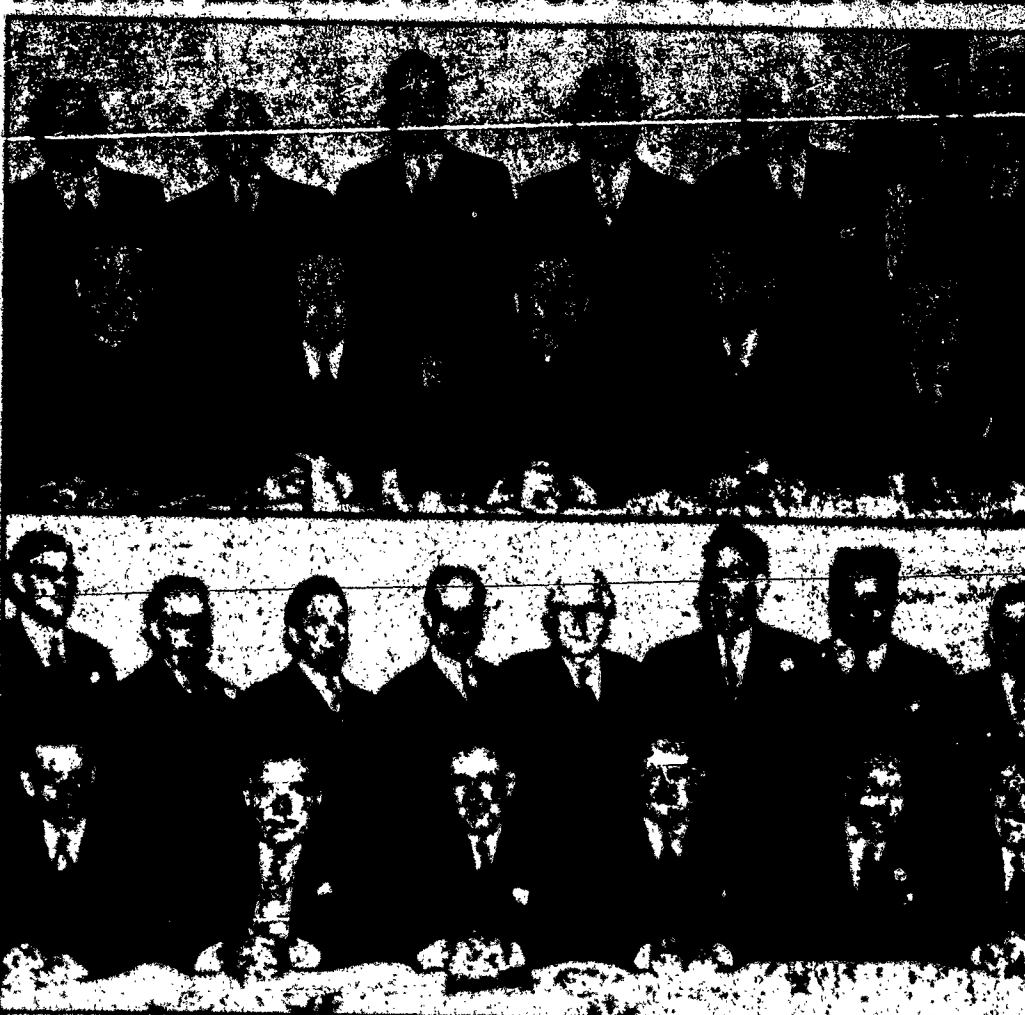

## 'Keep This God's Country,' Bishop Kearney Tells Auburn Knights Marking Anniversary

Auburn—It is the duty of the Knights of Columbus to keep this God's country, Bishop James E. Kearney told 350 members of Auburn Council No. 207 at their Golden Jubilee celebration Sunday evening.

Bishop Kearney recalled that in the day Christopher Columbus arrived in this land after his difficult voyage, a little Franciscan monk was the first to land and planted a crucifix to designate this as God's country.

He warned that religion is threatened on all sides and that the challenge cannot be met by relying on the glories of the past, but that the inspiration of the past should provide the courage to speak out.

Congratulating the Auburn Council on its anniversary, the Bishop cited the work done by the K. of C. to save the Catholic University of America and the work of the order in both world wars.

## Psychiatry Pioneering Completed by Jesuit

Seattle, Wash. — (NC) — New horizons will be opened in the field of psychiatry with the forthcoming publication of a work by the Rev. Dr. James E. McGoldrick, S.J., head of Seattle College's psychology department. The book, "Fundamentals in Psychiatry," to be published within six weeks, has been acclaimed by nationally known psychologists, who have seen the manuscript as a pioneer work in English in the field of psychiatry with scientific basis.

Father McGoldrick, a graduate of Dublin University, received doctorates in theology from the Gregorian University, Rome, and in education and psychology from the University of Washington. He took special training in psychiatry at the City Sanitarium, St. Louis, where he served as diagnostician during 1945.

## HITLER FOE TO LECTURE AT AQUINAS

Dr. Kurt von Schumacher, outstanding Catholic knight of peace, who recently arrived in this country, will deliver another lecture on Aquinas' Christian Culture lecture Sunday evening, Mar. 22 at 8 p. m. in Aquinas auditorium.

Dr. Schumacher, who spent seven years in military service, most under the "Steel helmet" will discuss "My Story," according to the Rev. Hugh Haffey, C. S. R., director and founder of the Christian Culture Series.

The date has been held open throughout the current lecture series in Cayo.

Born at Kirk, South Tyrol, now a part of Italy, he spent his early years in the army and was a general, known and feared as "The Thunderer." He attended the Jesuit gymnasium, St. Mattheus, the morning star of Feldkirch.

During the first World War he served as an Artillery Lieutenant and later became a lawyer at Innsbruck. From 1920 to 1927, he served as deputy of the Christian Social Party in the Vienna Parliament, Minister of Justice and Minister of Education.

Shortly after the assassination of Chancellor Dollfus in July 1928, Schumacher was appointed Chancellor and remained Chief of the Austrian government until March 11, 1934, when the Nazi hordes invaded Austria. The doctor was subsequently placed in solitary by 25 troops where he languished until released seven years later by the American 8th and British 14th Armies.

Schumacher arrived in New York on Thursday, Feb. 6 on the Belgian steamer "Fleur de Lys." He was accompanied by his wife, the former Countess von Fugger-Chamisso, who voluntarily joined him in the Nazi prison camp in 1932.
