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Soviet Barbarism Told by Budenz

which were going through Europe on those camps. There was mention of workhouses, of women, of writers and professors, of men of the Jewish race, who were confined to these squalid places of punishment.

From what I learned through those "don'ts" I accuse the Soviet dictators of being more harsh and callous than barbars where disease and death are rampant.

And the truth in their regard will be brought to the world's attention, despite the "iron curtain" and the NKVD, before many months have passed by. Men and women escaping from them will tell the world what degradation they bring to their heavily-guarded country.

The barbarism of the Soviet regime is again made evident in the mysterious manner in which dissidents, and particularly leading dissenters, disappear from view. Their lives are simply snuffed out, but the communists never leave any trace, and in other countries always advise secretly that the dead men were "enemies of the people." Of the many such who came to my notice—and I had to be sharply aware of them in order to function as editor of the Daily Worker—two can be noted now. One of them is G. Yesho, the other A. S. Venkidas.

As stamp "barbarism" upon the Kremlin dictatorship, further, is the increasing warfare upon the Catholic Church, the great historical guardian of Christian civilization. At the present moment this warfare is at a new height.

Every issue of the New Times, which is the current organ of the Communist International magazine, is filled with attacks upon the Catholic Church. What makes these assaults of such more serious importance is that the New Times, presented gratis to every communist, is the key to communist conduct throughout the world.

In its issue of January 23, 1947, which has only recently arrived in this country, a highly anti-religious article appeared on "The Anti-Democratic Activities of the Vatican." By a name very much like that of the New Times, the Daily Worker, in small states, the Daily Worker was instructed to run pieces telling how the people "welcomed the Red Army." All sorts of stories were provided the paper by Soviet sources, telling of how the "workers and peasants" had rushed

to our side.

"As we see," writes this organ of the Soviet state, "the Vatican and its subsidiaries are taking over the ideological and political leadership of the fight against democracy, using the slogan of fighting communism." Indeed, the church is put in the same class as Hitler, Mussolini and the Mikado, and threatened with the same fate. "We acknowledge no immunity of the princeps of the Catholic Church," writes this共产党派 newspaper, against the capitalist paper, against the Cardinal.

The indictment by Pope XI of the Soviet regime as the Satan

of a new Lucifer is contained.

When American troops this fall will march into Korea, it is to be hoped that they will not do so in another way.

Not too long thereafter, we will bring war to the Korean masses of deportees who escape from these lands. In every case where the new army has not yet been established, there will have been the order of the day, with such horrors as have gone the surgical knife, pictured as frequently as

anywhere else in the Korean peninsula.
