J. J. McInerney Rites Conducted

Funeral services for John J. McInerney, 73 prominent Rochester attorney who died Apr. 16, 1947 in a New York hospital, were conducted in St. John's Evangelist Church Saturday, Apr. 19.

Solemn Requiem Mass was offered by the Rev. John H. Sullivan, assisted by the Rev. John J. Leary, deacon, and the Rev. Walter Fleming, subdeacon.

In the sanctuary also were the Reverend Fathers Francis W. Luddy, Francis T. Wood and Louis J. Edelman.

His Excellency, Bishop Kearney imparted the final blessing assisted by the Rev. Dr. John E. Maney.

Mr. McInerney had retired from practice after 43 years as a lawyer a year ago last January and left Rochester to live in Tuxedo Park.

Mr. McInerney served as grand knight of Rochester Council in 1921, 1922 and 1923 and was an honorary member of the Council. During his administration the first campaign for funds was initiated by him for the present Columbus Civic Center. He had been active in affairs of St. John's parish and a leader in several Catholic groups.

Son of an Irish-born blacksmith, Michael G. McInerney, he was born in Salamanca. He was one of a family of six, four boys and two girls.

At the age of 13 he took his first job at \$3 a week in a factory. Later he held jobs with the Buffalo, Rochester, and Pittsburgh Railway, the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railroad at East Buffalo and the New York Railroad.

He became a subscription collector for the Union & Advertiser and the Rochester Herald, and later served as reporter for the latter.

He became known early in his law career for his eloquence and effectiveness before juries and won wide renown as a defense counsel in many spectacular trials of thirty years ago.

During the first World War, Mr. McInerney acted as chairman of a group who pushed the Liberty Loan drives. Four Minute Men, speaking throughout the area.

He was a member of the Rochester Bar Association and the New York State Bar Association, the Rochester Country Club, the Elks and the Moose and was a former president of the Automobile Club of Rochester Knights of Columbus.

Surviving are two sons, Brendan and Kevin McInerney of New York City, both attorneys, and a brother, Michael McInerney. Another son, John J. McInerney Jr., was drowned last year in a boating accident.

Rochester Nun's Rites in Texas

Funeral services for Sister Brendan, 69, a native of Rochester, who died Tuesday, Apr. 1, 1947 in a Dallas, Tex. hospital, were held Wednesday, Apr. 2 at the Sacred Heart Cathedral there.

A member of the Sisters of Charity of St. Vincent de Paul, Sister Brendan worked in the social service department of the outdoor clinic of St. Paul's Hospital. She was founder of the Marillac Clinic and social center for Mexicans.

Sister was born in Rochester. One year after she entered the order she went to Dallas where she had remained during forty three years of her labor.

She had been awarded a plaque by the Zonta Club and had received the Lino Award for outstanding social service work. She was also instrumental in building of the St. Paul's Hospital free clinic.

Surviving are four brothers, Migr. Patrick O'Beirne of Wichita Falls, Tex., Bernard O'Beirne of Bridgeport, Conn.; James O'Beirne of Port Gibson, N. Y. and Joseph McGovern O'Beirne, and a sister, Mrs. Maria Gartland of Rochester.
