Bishop Urges Chest Giving At Annual Mass

With approximately \$200,000 needed to carry on the work of the eight Catholic participating agencies in addition to the several other groups in which Catholics participate in their services, the 400 Community Chest workers are feverishly striving to attain the \$1,500,000 chest goal by Monday.

Budget needs of the Catholic agencies are: St. Ann's Home, \$14,327.37; St. Joseph's Villa, \$33,333.33; St. Mary's Hospital, \$33,333.33; Charles Settlement House, \$13,674.63; Columbus Youth Association, \$23,123.30; Genesee Settlement House, \$15,510.91; St. Elizabeth's Guild, \$3,621.36 and Rochester Catholic Charities, \$107,862.02.

In inaugurating a campaign as extensive as the Community Chest for 1947, His Excellency, Bishop Kearney said the project must be started with God's assistance. The Bishop spoke at a solemn High Mass celebrated in his presence at Sacred Heart Cathedral Sunday.

If donors to the Chest could see first hand the work their contributions accomplish among the aged, the dependent children, the youth in need of character direction, the ill and helpless they would increase their donations, the Bishop said.

The Mass was offered by priests whose lives are devoted to the work of dispensing the charity of Christ in this community the Bishop noted.

Celebrant of the Mass was the Rev. Gerald C. Lambert, director of Rochester Catholic Charities assisted by the Rev. Walter A. Fischer, director of the Social Action Department as Deacon and the Rev. Arthur E. Rath, director of Family and Child Placing Division as subdeacon with the Rev. Dr. John E. Maney as master of ceremonies. Assistants to the Bishop were the Rev. Austin B. Hanna, Chaplain of St. Joseph's Villa and the Rev. William F. Nolan, Cathedral assistant.

Rites Conducted For T. H. Green, Charities Leader

Funeral services for Thomas H. Green, 70, one of the original directors of the Rochester Catholic Charities, were conducted in Blessed Sacrament Church Wednesday morning, May 14.

Rev. Thomas F. Connors, pastor, offered the Solemn Requiem Mass.

Mr. Green, who was co-founder of the Old Wheeler Electric Company and founder of T. H. Green Company, Inc., died May 11, 1947, in St. Mary's Hospital. The charities leader had been hospitalized two weeks.

Born in Spencerport, Mr. Green came to Rochester when he was about 16 and became an employee for the Rochester Branch of the Edison Light Company, forerunner of the Rochester Gas & Electric Corporation. He went into the electrical business in 1900 with Clarence Wheeler, present vice-president of WHEC, Inc. The partnership was dissolved in 1926 and Mr. Green later organized his own electrical contracting business of which he was president, edged down in his field.

Mr. Green was a member of the Fourth Degree Assembly, Knights of Columbus, Musa Caravan, Order of the Alhambra, and the Holy Name Society as well as the Builders Exchange, New York State Electrical Contractors Association, the national organization and the Chamber of Commerce.

He is survived by his wife, Ida E. Green, one daughter, Mrs. Walter N. Parkes, two sons, George C. and Gerald J. Green; a sister, Mrs. Wilson Diefenderfer, and nine grandchildren. Burial was in Holy Sepulchre Cemetery.

Resolutions adopted at the county meeting included one requesting Congress to recognize the right of Catholic schools to share equally in any Federal aid which may be forthcoming as the result of measures now before Congress providing for Federal grants for educational purposes.

The resolution pointed out the right of each school to share in that program is predicated on the fact that these schools have assumed, and so effectively, the financial burden which education has imposed on the local government generally.

"It is an obvious discrimination to withhold such aid to these schools merely because they are not associated with the public school system," the resolution stated.

Copies of the resolution have been forwarded to the local representatives in the House and Senate.

Concert Set At Nazareth

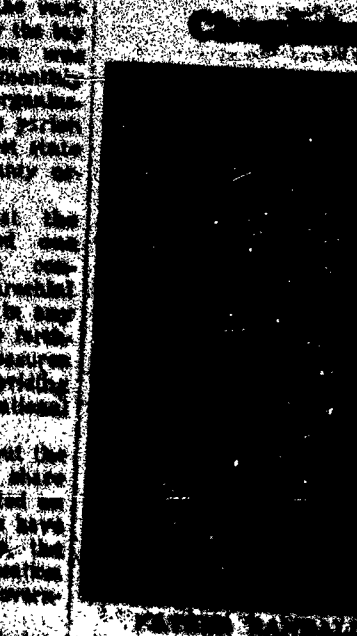
Nazareth Academy Orchestra and Glee Club will present their spring concert in Nazareth Academy auditorium Friday evening, May 30 at 8:15 p. m.

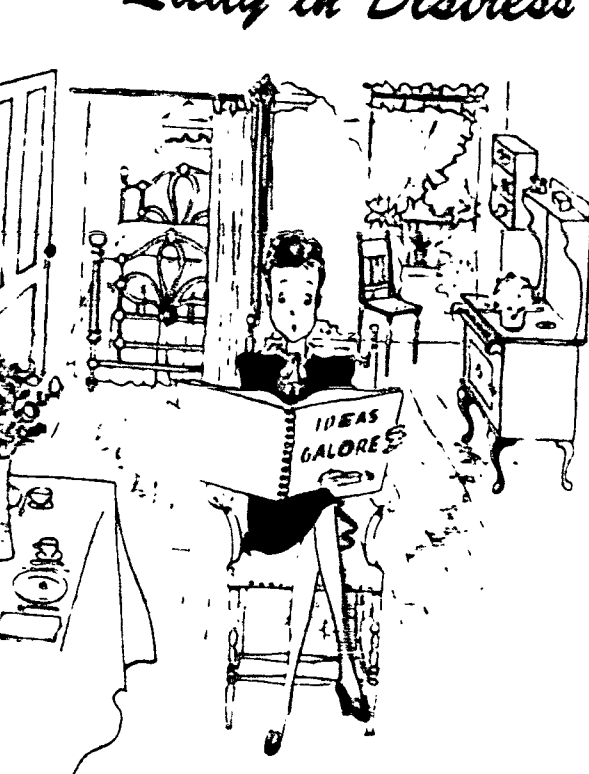
