

## Polish Cardinal In Rome For Papal Talks

Vatican City — (Radio, NC) — The visit of His Eminence Adam Cardinal Sapieha, Archbishop of Cracow, to the Vatican served exclusively for discussion of religious problems connected with the task of the spiritual and material reorganization of the Catholic Church in Poland. It was made clear in a statement issued at the Vatican.

The statement rejected as unfounded rumors to the effect that Cardinal Sapieha's visit as well as the one paid several months ago by His Eminence August Cardinal Hlond, Primate of Poland, had any connection with reported "negotiations" concerning the relations between the Holy See and the Government of the Soviet Union.

Cardinal Sapieha came to Rome "to deal exclusively with matters of a religious nature," the statement said, "with matters which are most important and essential to the future development of the Church in Poland: the reconstruction of seminaries, the recruiting of clergy and the fixing of ecclesiastical boundaries."

The statement added that these problems arising from the devastations suffered by the Church in Poland through war and the Nazi occupation, as well as from the changes of Poland's boundaries, were so vast and complex that their solution requires the counsel and support of the Holy See. In the course of his visit, Cardinal Sapieha had an audience with His Holiness Pope Pius XII and conferred with officials of the Sacred Congregations of the Sacraments and of Rites, the statement said. The Cardinal is returning to Poland early this month and will probably meet His Eminence Bernard Cardinal Griffin, Archbishop of Westminster, who is visiting Poland at the invitation of Cardinal Hlond.

## Two Roman Choirs Plan Tour of U.S.

Rome — (Radio, NC) — Two Roman choirs may be heard shortly in the United States in a series of concerts. They will be under the direction of Msgr. Licio Ruffo, director of the choir at the Basilica of St. Mary Major, and Monsignor Virgili, director of the choir at the Basilica of St. John Lateran.

It was pointed out, however, that while the choirs are composed of individuals who sing in the Basilica, the tours are not being conducted under any special Vatican auspices. It was added that the choirs are not permitted to use such terms as Vatican, Pontifical or the Pope's choirs to describe themselves in the United States.

## Natural Birth Control Misinformation Scored

Washington — (NC) — A "highly misleading advertisement" currently being circulated in just one incident of a series in which individuals displaying ethical and often medical ignorance have been circulating Catholics with misinformation on "natural birth control" usually for profit motives.

This charge was made by the Rev. Dr. Edgar Schmiedeler, O.S.B., one of the nation's leading family life authorities, who said "unquestionably some Catholics have been misled" by the presumptuousness of persons not qualified to speak in the field of morals.

Of the most recent campaign, which he said is among the worst, Father Schmiedeler reported the

Catholic authorities are quoted as if they approved the product, but the Catholic doctrine is "no means fully and correctly stated," Father Schmiedeler said. The promotion, national, quasi-encyclical on Christian marriage of Pope Pius XI and two volumes by Catholic authorities. To live a more companionable marriage, even through natural means, is most assuredly not in harmony with Christian morals," Father Schmiedeler commented. "Catholic people will know that their church has thousands of the highest trained moralists who are quite competent to teach them Catholic morality. She does not need a commercialized undertaking selling wares at the fancy price of 25 per item to inform her people in the field of morals."

Stating the Catholic position, Father Schmiedeler pointed out that the prime purpose of marriage is the child. Where there is serious reason to believe that it may be done by natural control, but even then should be under the guidance of one's confessor, he said.

"Time and again has the Catholic view of this matter been misrepresented in print by alleged non-Catholic spokesmen," Father Schmiedeler charged. "It seems strange that, in the face of our emphasis on science today, any untrained Tom, Dick and Harry can presume to speak in the difficult field of the laws of all sciences, moral theology. The Catholic Church does not need laymen or doctors or paid propagandists to speak for her in such a field. And Catholics people very properly resent their being so."
