Opening Set Sunday, June 29 For Camp Stella Maris

Stella Maris, Diocesan Youth Camp on Conesus Lake, will open its 1947 season on Sunday, June 29, Rev. Walter A. Fischer, diocesan youth director, has announced.

The camp offers a variety of sports including baseball, basketball, football, volleyball and dogball on its athletic field.

Swimming classes are given to all youngsters down at the Camp's waterfront under the trained eye of Red Cross instructors. Good swimmers are offered the chance to become Junior Life Guards.

For those who like to work with their hands, a well-equipped Craft Lodge has been set up. Facilities are here for the making of belts, airplanes, plastic models, moccasins and boon-dog gies.

Classes in outdoor life instruct the campers in the art of building fires, setting up tents, cooking and the like. Instruction is also given in dramatics which are practiced later at the camp fire closing each day.

Counselors are seminarians from St. Bernard's and St. Andrew's who serve under Father Fischer. The priest offers Mass each morning in the chapel for all campers.
